## Going by the current timelines:

- a) May-August: Make a list of all the folks you want to apply to (This might also be a good time to give your GRE, if you are applying to a school that still wants GRE).
- b) September-October: Start emailing professors that you had made a big list of.
- c) October-November: Schedule skype calls with professors and grad students in their labs who expressed interest to work with you. I think this is critical because we rarely get the opportunity to simply fly to the US/Europe to meet our prospective advisors. This will give you a better sense of whether you would like to work with prof X/Y.
- d) October-December: Around the same time, start drafting your applications SOPs are critical and most important for ecology programs. Reach out to your recommenders early enough so that they send a letter in time.

Wrap up apps by mid-December and then begins the anxious process of waiting to hear from schools
