JOSIAH WOLFCHAPEL CALLS FOR ACCOUNTABILITY OR HELLFIRE

Prominent Evangelical Rev. Josiah Wolfchapel has recently moved to AVL in the aftermath of a number of natural disasters and freak accidents. The television personality has spoken out against the intermittent nature of government aid in the last year and the lack of harsh convictions in the ongoing tragedies that have beset the local community. The southern preacher of humble origins is well known for his popular on TV antics, as well as his flash mob-like congregations. Josiah's entry to the Asheville scene involved a scathing rebuke of local politicians for sitting on their hands, and a reminder that hellfire does not spare the rich or the politically powerful.

This is a City of Asheville Water Department notification. The City of Asheville Water Department is issuing a Boil Water Notice for all City of Asheville Water Department customers.

A Boil Water Notice means there is low pressure in distribution pipes within the City of Asheville Water Department distribution system that increases the risk of airborne bacteria resulting in unsafe drinking water.

It is Required for customers to vigorously boil tap water for 1 minute before consuming it. Once laboratory testing of the system confirms the possibility of risk is not present, customers will receive notification that the boil water notice has been lifted via the same method you received this notice.

Vandalism at NCSU Lab Sparks Chemical Fire, Kills Guard

GREATER ASHEVILLE, NC – Extensive damage and the death of a security guard resulted from an overnight incident at North Carolina State University's Minerals Research Laboratory (MRL). Authorities responding to automated alarms discovered widespread vandalism throughout the facility, culminating in a significant fire believed to have been accidentally started by the perpetrators. Firefighters battled the blaze, which caused substantial fire and subsequent

water damage from sprinklers, particularly in sensitive research areas. Graffiti attributed to the Appalachian Earth Liberation Front (AELF) was found amidst the destruction.

Investigators are exploring the sequence of events, suggesting that reckless destruction of equipment and chemical storage likely led to an uncontrolled reaction, igniting the fire. The primary motive appears to have been disruption and property damage, targeting specific projects. Attention is focusing on the AELF and several recently dismissed MRL employees who had conflicts with the lab's management regarding its environmental practices and the University's corporate affiliations. The targeted nature of the initial vandalism suggests insider knowledge may have played a role in accessing and damaging key assets before the situation escalated.

The security guard, Dale Henderson of Blue Ridge Security Solutions, was found deceased within the facility. Evidence suggests he confronted the individuals during their act of vandalism and was overcome either in an altercation or by the subsequent fire and fumes. "This is a tragedy born from recklessness and criminal disregard for safety," commented a Blue Ridge Security spokesperson. "Dale Henderson was simply doing his duty. We are working closely with investigators."

The MRL is closed indefinitely while NCSU assesses the damage, ensures the site's safety, and plans for repairs. Local, state, and federal agencies are collaborating on the investigation, treating it as a major crime potentially involving domestic extremist elements. The incident underscores the dangers of unsecured chemicals and the potentially lethal consequences of politically motivated vandalism, leaving the university and local community deeply concerned.

The Appalachian Earth Liberation Front (AELF), previously noted for its fringe online presence and somewhat whimsical 'forest elf' mascot, has now captured serious federal attention. Authorities reported that the final message appearing on the group's website before it was taken offline stated: "Even the stones cry out when they're broken, and the mountain remembers every wound. The lab needed a time-out while they reconsider their use of shovels and pickaxes." In light of the deadly incident at the MRL, the FBI has officially designated the AELF a domestic terrorist group. Law enforcement sources confirm they are actively seeking the purported leader, identified as Silas "Greenwood" Vance, for questioning. Vance and other key figures associated with the AELF are believed to have absconded as the investigation ramps up.

Man Found Dead at Work, Silver Poisoning

ASHEVILLE, NC - Anthony Louis Mandrea, 54, was found dead at this South Asheville store from an apparent silver poisoning. Mandrea had owned and operated Silver Linings Silversmithy on Hendersonville Road for more than 30 years.

"He was prolific," said Benjamin Erisoglu, who manages the neighboring David's Bridal. "We would send him clients every few days, and everyone who went to see him was always amazed at how quickly he was able to turn things over. He had a knack for working out of his inspiration and moving on to the next artistic piece. He never lingered on work."

Silver poisoning is rare, but it can occasionally happen after an increased exposure to the metal. According to the Mayo Clinic, acute silver poisoning is rare and requires ingesting of large amounts of silver, but chronic exposure can lead to a build up that becomes toxic to the body.

Mandrea's family are planning an exhibit and auction in the River Arts District next month to raise funds for the family and employees of Silver Linings Silversmithy. "Jewelry jobs in Asheville are scarce, even for an artistic town," said Brittany Nantes, assistant store manager. "Retail's always an option, but we're skilled when it comes to silver. Who else did what Anthony did?"

Mandrea is survived by his wife and three children. In lieu of flowers, the family requested friends and loved ones donate to Habitat for Humanity of Asheville.
