



GOOGLE NINJA SEARCH TRICKS

Trick/Tool	Function
<p>Quotation marks ("") around the phrase you'd like to search</p> <p>Ex: "geography based punishments"</p>	<p>To search for an exact phrase. Important for searching obscure people with common names, titles, and complex phrases.</p>
<p>tilde sign (~) immediately in front of your search term.</p> <p>Ex: ~adolescent crime rates (looks for adolescent and juvenile and youth crime)</p>	<p>To search not only for your search term but also for its synonyms. <i>HINT type into search bar not an address bar.</i></p>
<p>Filetype:</p> <p>Ex: Dogs Filetype:PPT (will get you a powerpoint on dogs)</p>	<p>Search for specific types of files, such as PDFs, PPTs, or XLS or JPG</p>
<p>Site:</p> <p>Ex: Prisons Site:edu prisons site:www.nytimes.org</p>	<p>if you know you want your answer from within a specific site or type of site (.org, .edu).</p>
<p>Related:URL</p> <p>Ex: Related:https://www.themarshallproject.org/</p>	<p>To search for web pages that have similar content to a given site</p> <p><i>HINT: click to the 2nd page of results as the first page will usually be pings to other pages of the site.</i></p>
<p>Add a minus sign (-) before the word or site you don't want</p> <p>Ex: Jaguar -car (will get you only the animal)</p>	<p>To exclude results that include a particular word or site when searching words with multiple meanings.</p>
<p>Add "OR" between the key two words you are searching for</p> <p>Ex: teen OR youth</p>	<p>To search for multiple key words at once</p>
<p>Asterisk *</p> <p>teen* (will get you results for teen teenager teens)</p>	<p>To fill in the blank</p>



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Enter <i>"bacon number"</i> followed by celebrity	To look degrees of separation			
"Click off" or Lateral Searching	Click off / Open another tab and google author or source to find reputation. Also- a good way to see if news is "fake"--Leave the site you are on and open another tab and search the headline or title to see who else is talking about this. If a lot of reliable news outlets are - then likely not fake news. If someone is "breaking news" however, it might not show up yet.			
Snopes https://www.snopes.com/	Great site to check if your article is fake news or distorted information.			
YouTube	Look for speeches! Use the transcript.			
Wikipedia	Only good for the links/sources at the bottom. Do not cite and do not rely on the information. Not reliable because contributors are anonymous and no way to see if they are "experts"
