Mental Health Awareness Campaign: Changing the Culture Around Mental Illness: It's Way Past Time Dartmouth-Hitchcock's R.E.A.C.T. Mental Health Awareness Campaign provides individuals throughout New Hampshire and Vermont with tips about how to deal with signs of emotional suffering and with resources for support and help.

The R.E.A.C.T campaign was developed to provide clear next steps to take when someone sees some, or all, of the 5 Signs of emotional suffering in another person. R.E.A.C.T supplements the 5 Signs campaign developed by Barbara Van Dahlen of Change Direction. The idea for the 5 Signs was modeled on the theory that, like knowing the 5 Signs of a heart attack or stroke, we should all know the 5 Signs of emotional distress; and when we see those signs we should take action.

Led by Dartmouth-Hitchcock Senior Director of External Affairs John Broderick, formerly the Chief Justice of the NH Supreme Court, and in collaboration with the Children's Hospital at Dartmouth-Hitchcock, the New Hampshire Department of Education, the Vermont Agency of Education and other agencies and civic leaders across both states, Broderick has been reaching out to students, educators, parents, businesses and communities, to change the conversation on mental health and to help reduce stigma.

Broderick believes that "we have the ability to change the culture and the way mental health is viewed." He wants to spread this message to as many students, educators, parents, businesses and communities as he can.

## Matt Bellace, Ph.D. Motivational Speaker and Comedian

**Keynote Title:** Life Is Disappointing and Other Inspiring Thoughts

**Description:** You won't want to miss Dr. Matt Bellace, a clinical psychologist and stand-up comedian, delivering his humorous and interactive keynote. The presentation will focus on coping with disappointment, ways to reduce stress and manage emotions. Dr. Bellace's unique style of integrating science with funny stories and audience participation should make for a memorable kick-off to the conference! Some of the takeaways will include using pain, loss and failure for inspiration, the science of meditation and cognitive behavioral techniques that increase resilience.

**Bio:** Since 1995, Matt Bellace, Ph.D., has been a professional speaker and stand-up comedian. His programs encourage over a hundred thousand students and adults each year to pursue natural highs (e.g. laughter, meditation) and be resilient in the face of stress.

Dr. Bellace has a Ph.D. in clinical neuropsychology, which is the study of the brain and behavior. He worked at the National Institutes of Mental Health, and completed his internship at the traumatic brain and spinal cord units at The Mount Sinai Medical Center in New York City. His dissertation focused on the neurological underpinnings of emotional memory and was published in the *International Journal of Neuroscience*.

He's the author of the best-selling book, A Better High: Laugh, Help, Run, Love and Other Ways to Get Naturally High. His most recent book is focused on healthy ways to cope with pain, loss and failure, titled Life Is Disappointing and Other Inspiring Thoughts.

He was featured in the documentary *Voices of Hope and Recovery*, which aired on CBS stations throughout Maine.

#### You Have the Power: Building Resilience to Cope

SESSION DESCRIPTION: We live in an environment that can be challenging both personally and professionally. How can adults and youth effectively achieve and exceed their goals and make healthy decisions when they are overwhelmed by possible Adverse Childhood Experiences, stress, social media, responsibilities of our jobs/school and balancing our personal lives? This 75-minute, motivational, interactive seminar reminds attendees that they "have the power" to exceed their own expectations by living by 5 basic principles: The Power of Believing, The Power of Positive Thinking, The Power of Doing, The Power of Failure, and The Power of Choice. This seminar has helped to build self-esteem and offer user-friendly tools and hope to hundreds of attendees; no matter their background or challenges and provide healthy ways to combat trauma and stress rather than self-medication and other self-destructive behaviors.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: After receiving her B.A. in Communications with high honors from the University of Maine at Orono, Laura spent 10 years in the hotel industry as a Regional Director of Sales and National Leadership Trainer with Marriott Corporation. In 2000, she founded the Second Chance Foundation with the mission of helping youth make healthy decisions through ongoing preventive interactive theatrical school programs on bullying, substance misuse, suicide, tobacco prevention and other topics. For over 10 years, she worked as a facilitator and theatrical director with the Council for Drug Free Youth as well as overseeing the Drug Free Community grant in mid-Missouri. After relocating back to Maine 5 years ago, she continued her work in prevention as the Project Director for Be the Influence, a Drug Free Community grant, including building a coalition of community members who have collectively worked to reduce youth substance use in the Windham/Raymond area. She is certified as a Prevention Specialist, DEEP/TIPS Trainer as well as a motivational speaker and CADCA prevention graduate.

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** As we see a growing attention to our young people's mental health, it's important that we have a good understanding of the struggles our youth may be facing. **PRESENTER BACKGROUND:** With a degree in Social Science, maintaining a license in social work, and a professional history in child welfare, Thyrring comes to us ready to discuss mental wellness, resources, and self-care. Thyrring has a passion for bettering the lives of Maine's young people and helping them successfully transition to adulthood.

## Maine Resilience Building Network: Cultivating Youth Mattering

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** Data in Maine highlights that almost half our youth feel they don't matter to their community and an overwhelming number suffer with anxiety, depression and feelings of loneliness. Mattering and social connectedness are protective factors that reduce the likelihood of poor mental health, suicide and substance misuse. Participants of this learning session will leave with a grounding in the science of mattering and belonging, learn about statewide data, and understand how cultivating mattering builds resilient communities. Lastly, participants will be able to identify strategies that build resilience and hear of statewide efforts to build connectedness. Learning Objectives: 1. Ground participants in the science of mattering; 2. Understand state and local data on mattering and protective factors for youth; 3. Learn from participants ways to engage and cultivate mattering in youth.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: Ruby Parker is the Engagement & Education Director for the Maine Resilience Building Network (MRBN). Ruby provides education across the state to build awareness of the impact of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and the importance of protective factors in building resilience. Ruby provides opportunities for learning to parents, policy makers, professionals, and

community members. Prior to joining MRBN, Ruby worked on an ACES statewide education effort in the state of Maryland where she built a learning collaborative of professional trainers who worked to spread awareness through presentations designed to build self-healing communities. Ruby participates as a member of a number of coalitions, committees and task forces all aimed to address trauma and promote safe and supportive environments for children. Ruby obtained her education in Baltimore with a bachelor's degree in Sociology from Goucher College and a master's degree in Conflict Management from the University of Baltimore.

## Sidekicks: Motivational Interviewing for Youth

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** The Sidekicks program has the goal of working with young people and adult advisors in Maine to help teens find the words to talk to their peers about tobacco use and vaping. Once trained as a Sidekick, youth have the skills to hold respectful conversations with their peers about tobacco use, as well as other risky behaviors. The Sidekicks Program teaches youth introductory motivational interviewing skills -- giving them the ability to use these skills in a variety of difficult to talk about topics, including mental, emotional, and behavioral health.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: Val Johnstone is a Community Health Promotion Specialist in the City of Portland Public Health's Tobacco Prevention Program. After 3 years of facilitating conversations about healthy relationships and consent at a local sexual violence response agency, Val transitioned to the field of tobacco prevention to advocate for healthy, smoke-free spaces. Val is passionate about prevention education, community engagement, and connecting individuals with free, local resources. Val is currently working on her Master of Public Health at the University of Southern Maine.

## **Naloxone Training: Reversing Overdoses and Saving Lives**

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** In 2018, the Surgeon General released an advisory emphasizing the importance of the overdose reversing medication naloxone. The advisory states that knowing how to use naloxone and keeping it within reach can save a life, and encourages anyone who might be in the position to reverse an opioid overdose to carry naloxone. The goals of this presentation are to raise awareness about the incidence of overdose in our communities, educate participants about naloxone, and to teach participants how to administer naloxone. Following this training, participants will have the opportunity to receive a free kit of naloxone at a pick-up time/date TBD.

The Office of Behavioral Health has partnered with behavioral health agencies across the state to develop the OPTIONS (Overdose Prevention Through Intensive Outreach, Naloxone, and Safety) Program. The program placed a substance use clinician in each county who is embedded in a law enforcement agency to respond to overdose events in real time, outreach and provide support to community resources, distribute naloxone, provide trainings for the community, and help connect individuals in need with resources to improve their health, and therefore the health of the community at large. Sweetser is the partner for York, Cumberland, Sagadahoc, Lincoln, Knox, and Waldo Counties.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: Alyssa Pelchat, LCSW, CCS, has a master's degree in social work from the University of New England and is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker and a Certified Clinical Supervisor. She has worked with children, teens, and adults in various settings including primary care, residential, in-home, and corrections. Her interest in substance use treatment developed while working as a behavioral health clinician at Maine Correctional Center in Windham. She currently works for Sweetser as the supervisor of Crisis Triage and the OPTIONS (Overdose Prevention Through Intensive Outreach, Naloxone, and Safety) Program. Alyssa grew up in Raymond and attended Jordan-Small Elementary School. She has returned to live in Raymond with her husband and son who is in kindergarten at Raymond Elementary School.

#### Supporting Youth Mental Wellness and Resilience in an Uncertain World

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** Everyone is living in a period of uncertainty, increased risk, isolation and stress. Some of this was true even before the pandemic brought increased risk of illness, the need for social distancing and a political dialogue where we struggle to agree about basic steps to maintain safety. Our youth face these stresses and uncertainty with less experience and, often, fewer established coping skills. We will focus on the elements of resilience and what we all can do to support our youth and ourselves as we walk a path through the pandemic.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: Greg Marley has practiced in the field of community mental health in Maine for over 30 years, as a clinician, clinical supervisor, manager, trainer, and consultant. Since 2007, he has developed and presented training and education supporting suicide prevention and management. Greg has presented across Maine and New England to a variety of audiences in suicide prevention, substance abuse prevention, mental health and other topics. Since 2009 he has provided training and consultation to schools, primary care practices, hospitals, and mental health programs supporting suicide prevention and intervention as well as support in the aftermath of a suicide loss. In the rest of his life, Greg is renowned as an expert in edible, medicinal and toxic wild mushrooms.

## Trauma-Responsive Strategies for Youth Engagement & Community Resilience

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** The Opportunity Alliance's Public Health Program & Maine Youth Action Network staff will present on effective strategies for what supports young people to thrive in their communities. Presenters will discuss community-level barriers to thriving, reasons why some young people may experience increased barriers or stress, and what approaches are most effective for engaging all young people in building resilience. Come discuss actions we can all take to support young people in achieving positive mental health.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: Jana Richards is the Program Manager with the Public Health Program at the Opportunity Alliance. The Public Health Program supports and engages communities across Cumberland County to improve health and wellness for us. Jana has been a member of the Public Health team for 7 years, and has expertise in substance use prevention, youth mental health promotion, and health-related policy change. She particularly enjoys facilitating collaboration between community members and service providers to achieve sustainable and effective community health improvements. Jana has had the privilege of focusing some of her time in the more rural Lake Region communities of Cumberland County, and currently lives in Standish.

Lee Anne Dodge is a certified prevention specialist and is the program director of SoPo Unite- All Ages-All In, a Drug Free Communities Coalition. She has worked in the field of substance use prevention and intervention for over twenty years. She is a Prime For Life instructor and teaches DEEP (Driver Education and Evaluation Program) to people under the age of twenty one who have been arrested for Operating Under the Influence. She lives in Dresden with her husband Andy, and their yellow Lab: Minnie Pearl.

## Introduction to Cannabis Pharmacology and Effects For Youth

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** In this session, the presenter will provide an overview of the current state of the science with respect to the pharmacology of cannabis and how it impacts youth. This will include information about the various forms, potencies, and health effects, along with the issues of addiction, brain development, and more. Additionally, the presenter will discuss the importance of prevention, and how we approach youth cannabis prevention in an era of commercial cannabis.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: Scott M. Gagnon, MPP, PS-C is a Certified Prevention Specialist, Associate Executive Director of AdCare Educational Institute of Maine, Inc., and Director of the New England Prevention Technology Transfer Center (PTTC). Appointed by the Maine Speaker of the House, Scott serves as the public health representative on Maine's Marijuana Advisory Commission. Scott is the chair of the national PTTC Network's Cannabis Prevention Work Group. Scott was Co Chair of the Prevention Task Force for the Maine Opiate Collaborative and has served on the SAMHSA, Center for Substance Abuse Prevention National Advisory Council. Scott speaks and trains nationally on cannabis

science, prevention, and policy, as well as on workforce development and other prevention topics, including at the CADCA National Leadership Forum, CADCA Midyear Training Institute, and the National Prevention Network Conference. Scott's work has been recognized with awards from multiple organizations, including the Maine Alliance to Prevent Substance Abuse, Healthy Androscoggin, and the Maine Public Health Association. In 2017, Scott was the recipient of the Patrick J. Kennedy Outstanding Advocate Award from Smart Approaches to Marijuana.

## Sidekicks: Motivational Interviewing for Youth

#### Naloxone Training: Reversing Overdoses and Saving Lives

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** In 2018, the Surgeon General released an advisory emphasizing the importance of the overdose reversing medication naloxone. The advisory states that knowing how to use naloxone and keeping it within reach can save a life, and encourages anyone who might be in the position to reverse an opioid overdose to carry naloxone. The goals of this presentation are to raise awareness about the incidence of overdose in our communities, educate participants about naloxone, and to teach participants how to administer naloxone. Following this training, participants will have the opportunity to receive a free kit of naloxone at a pick-up time/date TBD.

The Office of Behavioral Health has partnered with behavioral health agencies across the state to develop the OPTIONS (Overdose Prevention Through Intensive Outreach, Naloxone, and Safety) Program. The program placed a substance use clinician in each county who is embedded in a law enforcement agency to respond to overdose events in real time, outreach and provide support to community resources, distribute naloxone, provide trainings for the community, and help connect individuals in need with resources to improve their health, and therefore the health of the community at large. Sweetser is the partner for York, Cumberland, Sagadahoc, Lincoln, Knox, and Waldo Counties.

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** Graphic novels are proven to be effective ways to get students of a variety of reading levels and comfort, including reluctant readers, English as a second language readers, and readers with below expected reading levels engaged with stories. Graphic medicine is a subgenre that combines the aesthetic and story telling of a graphic novel with health information. *In the Air* is a Graphic Medicine written and produced by the New England Prevention Technology Transfer Center and partners designed with prevention science in mind to support conversations between adults with prevention knowledge and students in grades 6-12. Major themes include; risk and protective factors, choices and consequences, and

Prevention Technology Transfer Center social elements. *In the Air* can be used to foster conversations informally, or as a structured part of a curriculum using the accompanying facilitator's guide.

During this break out session, you will learn about how the novel was youth lead in its creation, how to use it and the facilitator's guide, what resources are available to you, how to let the students lead a conversation for an authentic, organic style of universal prevention, how to request a copy or copies, and you will have an opportunity to practice your facilitation skills using the novel.

Once trained as a Sidekick, youth have the skills to hold respectful conversations with their peers about tobacco use, as well as other risky behaviors. The Sidekicks Program teaches youth introductory motivational interviewing skills -- giving them the ability to use these skills in a variety of difficult to talk about topics, including mental, emotional, and behavioral health.

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#### CHOICE #4

## **Fostering Resilient Environments**

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** Preventing and healing ACEs is possible. No matter our age, there are science-informed ways to support resilience and recovery. Breakthrough neuroscience will be reviewed along with an introduction to the nervous systems response to stress providing participants with a model for understanding emotion regulation. The science of compassion and mindfulness will also be explored

including new understandings about burnout. Participants will leave with strategies, tools and resources that support and promote resilience and well-being.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: Ruby Parker is the Engagement & Education Director for the Maine Resilience Building Network (MRBN). Ruby provides education across the state to build awareness of the impact of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) and the importance of protective factors in building resilience. Ruby provides opportunities for learning to parents, policy makers, professionals, and community members. Prior to joining MRBN, Ruby worked on an ACES statewide education effort in the state of Maryland where she built a learning collaborative of professional trainers who worked to spread awareness through presentations designed to build self-healing communities. Ruby participates as a member of a number of coalitions, committees and task forces all aimed to address trauma and promote safe and supportive environments for children. Ruby obtained her education in Baltimore with a bachelor's degree in Sociology from Goucher College and a master's degree in Conflict Management from the University of Baltimore.

## Introduction to Supporting Those At Risk

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** *Introduction to Supporting Those At Risk* is a presentation that provides information and resources on how to support someone in your life with lived experience. This program focuses on loved ones and supporters of those with lived experience. The program is equipped with a PowerPoint presentation and takeaway resources.

#### **Audience**

Introduction to Supporting Those At Risk is intended for supporters of those with lived experience. Lived experience is defined as a suicide attempt and/or experiences with suicidal thoughts. The content is appropriate for those 18 or older, and has information specific to supporters of those with lived experience, which includes anyone who supports someone who experiences suicidal ideation or who has made a past suicide attempt.

**PRESENTER BACKGROUND:** Shamera Simpson is the Area Director for the American Foundation for Suicide – New Hampshire and Maine Chapters. AFSP creates a culture that's smart about mental health through education and community programs, develops suicide prevention through research and advocacy, and provides support for those affected by suicide. As the mother of four teenagers, Shamera is a passionate advocate for mental health education and support for youth.

## Addiction Stigma

**SESSION DESCRIPTION:** Addiction is a neurobiological disease that is highly correlated with trauma. Presentation attendees will learn to define and identify stigma related to substance use disorders and understand how the stigma about SUDs impacts treatment and recovery. There are easy things that anyone can do to reduce the impact and perpetuation of stigma. Attendees will be presented with destigmatized language related to addiction, and engage in a discussion about guilt versus shame. Learn more about how small shifts in language and attitude can help young people stay connected and feel heard.

PRESENTER BACKGROUND: Alyssa Pelchat, LCSW, CCS, has a master's degree in social work from the University of New England and is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker and a Certified Clinical Supervisor. She has worked with children, teens, and adults in various settings including primary care, residential, in-home, and corrections. Her interest in substance use treatment developed while working as a behavioral health clinician at Maine Correctional Center in Windham. She currently works for Sweetser as the supervisor of Crisis Triage and the OPTIONS (Overdose Prevention Through Intensive Outreach, Naloxone, and Safety) Program. Alyssa grew up in Raymond and attended Jordan-Small Elementary School. She has returned to live in Raymond with her husband and son who is in kindergarten at
