Total of one (1) training was organized for three (3) farmer's Male 2 and Female 1 on Indigenous Micro-Organisms (IMO) technology for sustainable pig production within the District. The Indigenous Micro-Organism(IMO) technology which is an organic method of rearing livestock could reliably mitigate the challenges and constraints facing the pig industry in the District. 	100% target achieved

5	Conduct Monitoring and Supervisory visits to All Planned Activities in The District (DAOs & DDAs)	6 Monitoring 8 DPCU 1 DDA 4 DAOs	<p>The main aim of the budgeted plan activity was to monitor and supervise the ongoing MAG programmes in the District, for proper accountability of funds. It also helps to determine the level of impact on beneficiary farmers within the district. The monitoring was done on the 22nd August, 2022 in the third quarter.</p> <p>The following activities was monitored: -</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Visits to pepper and tomato demonstration fields to assist farmers solve some identified problems at Ceserkope, Koluedor and Nakomkope. 2. Visits to mango and coconut farms under the planting for jobs and investment initiative across the District. 3. Visits to some women farmer groups (Pepper processors) at Hawkpo and Goi. <p>Again, the team with some staff of NADMO made visit to Kuiper's breeds on 5th September, 2022. Kuiper's breeds are international company establishing a well modern poultry structure to raise over 20,000 day old chicks daily. The company has currently employed total of 300 workers which most are from the community around.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 4. Management of the Department has visited some maize farms attack by fall army at the following areas Koluedor, Nakomkope and Dogorborm etc. The team is to check the control level of the chemical that were used on the crops. 5. Total of one (1) monitoring visit was made to Adjumanikope, Toflokpo, Koni and Sege and some selected farmers' fields. 6. The team check on the effectiveness of the fruit fly traps set in some selected mango farms within the district. The monitoring also discovers that, the PFJ tomato subsidized seed supply by government was helpful and has increased the level of production within the district. However, farmers complain of one of the PFJ seeds (Roman) tomato variety that mostly get soften and goes rotten, if left on the field for a longer time. <p>The monitoring team also visited a PERD beneficiaries at Afiadenyigbey and it was discovering that out of 5,000 seedlings supplied to farmers, total of 1,500 trees were burnt by sun on the field. This due to lack of water for the plants.</p>	100% target achieved

Major Crop Performance

Cultivation of crops under PFJ is ongoing for the period. Cultivation level of commodities such as Maize, tomato and pepper was on the decrease for the reporting period due to unfavorable rainfall. All the inputs under PFJ is available and accessible to farmers.

Increased Farmer Income

Through Government's support in subsidizing agriculture inputs, farmers are very optimistic of increasing incomes to improve livelihoods and poverty. Farmers were also encouraged to engaged in different types of business and enterprises to boost their income level. Farmers were also educated to make some savings after harvesting their produce to reduce poverty and hunger.

Gross Margin of major staple crops

The department has not done any survey on the gross margin of major staple crops in the district.

Livestock Production

Livestock rearing is another important agricultural activity in the district. The livestock produced in the district are cattle, sheep and goats, pig, poultry (fowls, turkey, duck, and guinea fowl.). Ayisah, Koluedor and Caesarkope are the main cattle rearing areas in the district. The average stock is about 80 animals per kraal except for few kraals where there are over 100 animals. It can be observed that the production of fowl, pig and grass-cutter in the district is dwindling over the years.
