It clearly formulates the research questions or objectives and situates the study within the existing body of scholarship by critically engaging with prior research. This engagement involves identifying the strengths and limitations of previous studies and demonstrating a distinct research gap that constitutes the novelty of the present research.

The introduction further establishes the significance of the study, whether in reinforcing, extending, or contesting existing theoretical frameworks.

References primarily draw on authoritative books and peer-reviewed journal articles published within **the last 5 (five) to 10 years**.

The introduction should be **a maximum of 750 words, using Book Antiqua font, 12pt, and single line spacing**.

Methods [13pt, Book Antiqua]

Describe in detail the research methods employed in this study, including the research approach, types and sources of data, data collection techniques, and methods of data analysis.

The selected methodology must be supported by relevant references. The research methods should be formulated in a clear and concise manner, with **a maximum length of 350 words, using Book Antiqua font, 12pt, and single line spacing**.

Finding and Discussion [13pt, Book Antiqua]

The First Aspect of the Finding and Discussion [12pt, Book Antiqua]

The Findings and Discussion section comprises at least two aspects, each systematically presented and critically analyzed based on valid and up-to-date data sources.

The First Aspect of the Findings and Discussion provides a comprehensive description and critical analysis of the research problem. The subsequent sections, the Second or the Third Aspect, advance proposed solutions or conceptual frameworks to address the identified issues.

The Second Aspect of the Finding and Discussion [12pt, Book Antiqua]

A reference must also be put in the end of every citation that paraphrases ideas from someone's works. If citation is taken from a paper in a journal (Guerra, 2025) or this journal, (Pablo, 2024) research reports, (Marcel, 2023) and a Master or Ph.D thesis. (Diman, 2022) Please note that all citations must use APA Style.

The Third Aspect of the Finding and Discussion (if any) [12pt, Book Antiqua]

It is possible to add sections as needed. A section may consist of several sub-sections, typed in bold-italic and numbered list style, like the following example.

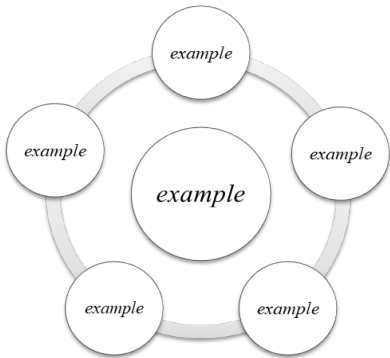

 - 5) Arabic word should be transliterated according to AWARANING style of Arabic transliteration, please insert every symbol of transliterated Arabic letter as a proper Unicode character symbol;
