From time to time I take visitors from Germany or Austria on a private walking tour of Glasgow. They're usually keen to see more of the city, but they're also interested in my life here. What brought me here, and what keeps me after so many years in Scotland.

One thing they always ask is how I deal with the constant rain.

Mind you, it rarely ever actually rains when I do my walking tours of Glasgow. I'm just lucky like that.

Or maybe it is fate, so I can say, "well, it's actually not that bad."

But that is only half the story...

Rainfall, downpour, drizzle, sprinkle, lashing, cats and dogs.

How many ways can you think of to say that it's raining?

When I went to uni still, and rode my bike from the East End of Glasgow to the West End every day I used to love the rainy days. Pull up my overtrousers, gloves on, put my head down and cycle right into it.

The rain felt like life hitting my face and I couldn't help but laugh as I let the bike run down the hill.

Rain back home usually means it's pouring. But here in Scotland, it can rain and shine, literally at the same time. I look up, wondering where the raindrops are coming from only to see blue sky and sunshine above my head. The rain clouds are some way off, at an angle, only the wind carrying its gifts of life.

The basic word for rain in Gaelic, is simply *uisge* - the same word as for water. There's no difference.

Rain is water and water is life. And the water of life? Well, that's a story for a different day...

There is light rain and heavy rain - fras, tuil agus smugraich uisge.

You never know whether it's gonnae last 3 weeks or 3 minutes.

I wake up in the morning, rain beating against my bedroom window and an hour later, I sit in the garden sipping my morning coffee in the sunshine. Mind you, I had to bring out a dry chair.

And after the rain comes *turadh* - the break in the clouds I've been waiting for.

Quickly, come out of hiding and continue on your way, until it is time to duck again, find shelter, and watch the raindrops fall to the ground.

Without the rain, Scotland would be dry and cold. It keeps the hills green and the flowers blooming. It keeps the stills running and the drafts coming. It keeps the spirits up and life moving.

How I deal with the constant rain, you ask? Try to imagine a Scotland without it and you'll soon realise that without a cloud, there's no silver lining.
