Why are learning basic digital skills important?

Children really don't understand full computerization.

Digital resilience! Apply skills. Digital natives can be naive!

Children are not receiving basic digital skills class in schools and are unprepared upon graduation. File management is an example of an unknown skill. Kids are assumed to be digital natives, therefore they are overlooked when it comes to digital skill building. However, they do not fully grasp the technology and we want to encourage a feeling of empowerment for them to fully learn the skills. Fully learning skills builds confidence that transfer to other platforms and endeavors. Digital resilience, knowing multiple platforms/software to be able to complete tasks. Being able to seek out the solution on unknown digital platforms is a skill itself. Being able to navigate new technology.

How do we define necessary skills, why is it important individuals can be fluid in using different platforms?

- Remember digital literacy is important in all aspects of life.

These three combine to help decide the curriculum to use. Multiple platforms makes students more competitive in job market.

Critical Thinking - Helps student being able to see a new technology/platform and be able to find a solution for it

Collaboration, communication, creativity

What competencies are necessary for students to succeed in a digital environment? <a href="ISTE standards">ISTE standards</a>

- \*Teach skills to access resources (Jobs, housing, financial aid)
- \* teach Microsoft office suite because Google workspace is not really used for college or jobs
- \* advocate for computer science classes in schools K-12
- \* teach curriculum that helps people use multiple platforms

- \* video conference software skills
- \* make sure clients have a transferable skill
- \* critical thinking, collaboration, creativity
- \* talk with clients about what they're goals are and then formulate a plan to assist them accomplish them
- \* class about how to shop for good deals online ( digital skills, web navigation, fun learning) holidays, back to school, birthdays
- \* ISTE standards
- \* assess skills, so that we can show progress in client( dignity equity)
- \* digital literacy assessment.org (North Star)

Pre-assessment > teaching > post-assessment - shows progress which is powerful and gives students a feeling of agency. Shows them that time invested in learning can make a difference and encourage them to learn other skills.

Find the driving motivation for learning of your community, and don't be afraid to adjust curriculum to teach the skills your community is excited to learn.

Reach out to community organizations and partners to assist with outreach. Community centers have already built trusted relations with the community around.

# How is assessment administered?
