Howdy. It's January 31st, 2022, I'm Kim, and the frog of the week is the Eastern Banjo Frog.

Lemme guess- you think this frog is from the American South. So did I! But in fact, it's endemic to eastern Australia. There are five subspecies- the most recognizable of which is mottled brown or gray, with yellow or orange sides. But there's a fair amount of variation, with one subspecies even being blue in color.

The Eastern Banjo Frog is a burrowing species, spending most of its time underground when the weather is dry, but surfacing en masse after rain. They're even known to call from their underground burrows. The Eastern Banjo Frog gets its name from this call- a gentle bonk, which is said to resemble the sound of a banjo string being plucked.
