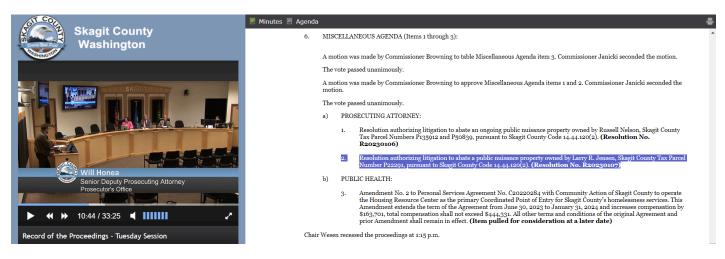
Report on the Origins of Compliance #: CE23-0057

At the Skagit County Commissioner's meeting on May 30th, 2023, the 3 county commissioners and Will Honea discussed Resolution No. R20230107 which authorized litigation to abate a public nuisance at a property owned by Larry Jensen (Parcel Number P22291). During this discussion the 3 commissioners and Will Honea made a point to talk about Skagit County's code enforcement procedures and the necessity of a "Request for Investigation" completed by a concerned citizen or business. This complaint-based system is supposed to ensure that there is no unfair treatment under the law.



In response to Public Records Request 23-0967, Code Compliance Officer Tom Wenzl confirmed that the complaint that led to Compliance #: CE23-0057 was internally generated by PDS staff for building, zoning, and Natural Resources (Critical Areas) violations.

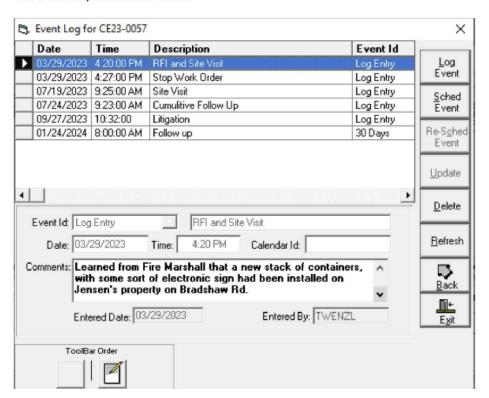

From here, two related yet distinct public records requests were made in hopes of identifying the specific Fire Marshall employee who initiated the internal complaint.

Public Records Request 23-1290:

According to the response on Records Request 23-1185,

A member of the Fire Marshall department notified Tom Wenzl that a new stack of shipping containers with an electronic sign had been installed on Larry Jensen's property on Bradshaw Road (Parcel: P22291) which lead to Compliance CE23-0057

This is a request for all official communication between the Fire Marshall department and Tom Wenzl related to Wenzl's RFI and Site Visit on 3/29/2023

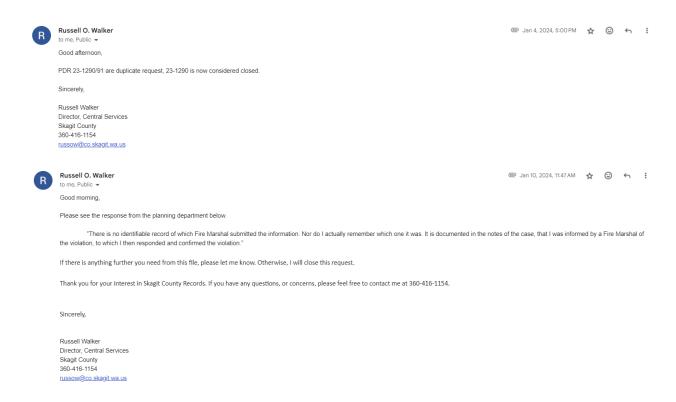
Public Records Request 23-1291:

According to the response on Records Request 23-1185,

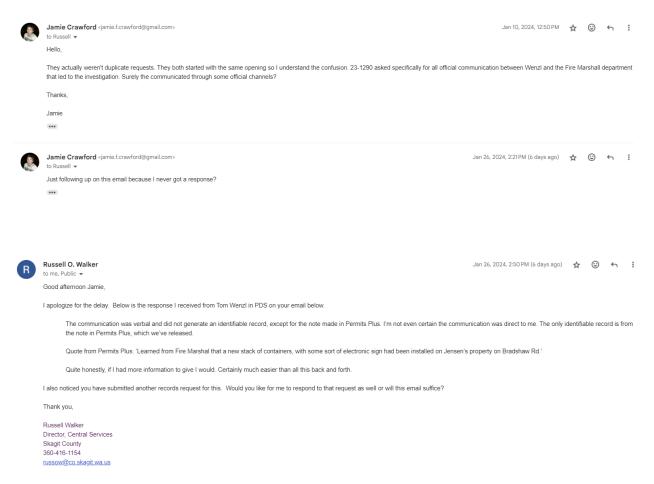
A member of the Fire Marshall department notified Tom Wenzl that a new stack of shipping containers with an electronic sign had been installed on Larry Jensen's property on Bradshaw Road (Parcel: P22291) which lead to Compliance CE23-0057

This is a request for documentation of the specific-Fire Marshall department staff member that notified Tom Wenzl and led to his RFI and Site Visit on 3/29/2023

Despite being distinct and separate requests, they were combined into one request, and request 23-1290 which requested official communication was sidestepped and closed. Request 23-1291 was determined to have no identifiable record and was closed.



Since the two requests were wrongly labeled as duplicates, this was pointed out and a request for official communications as stated in request 23-1290 was reiterated. It took 16 days and further persistence to get an answer.



At this point it has been confirmed that there is no documented origin of the internally generated complaint that led to Compliance #: CE23-0057. As the three Commissioners and Will Honea openly discussed at the meeting on May 30th, 2023, the request for investigation system of code enforcement exists to ensure there is no unfair treatment under the law. This reasoning is nullified and potential unfair treatment cannot be ruled out when code enforcement is based on internal complaints with no documented origin, as is the case with Compliance #: CE23-0057.

A submitted RFI was never given as an identifiable record in any of the relevant public records requests made regarding Compliance #: CE23-0057. Yet as stated in Skagit County Code Enforcement Operations and Prioritization Policy, "PDS staff should not investigate alleged violations without a completed RFI Form."

Code Enforcement Operations and Prioritization Policy (Standard Operating Procedures)

Guiding Principles

- · Code enforcement should be fair, firm, and consistent.
- Procedures should not incentivize landowners to beg forgiveness instead of asking permission.
- Staff should not enforce violations of the zoning code alone (without a related building code or critical
 areas violation) without a complaint from the public.

General Operating Policies

- Planning and Development Services (PDS) should only act in response to complaints ("Requests for Investigation") in which the submitter indicates he or she has seen the facts alleged.
- · PDS should not accept anonymous complaints.
 - Exception for complaints related to the Clean Samish Initiative's goals and purpose: upon receipt of an anonymous complaint, PDS should conduct a drive-by visual inspection and fill out an RFI form if that inspection reveals a likely code violation.
- PDS staff should not fill out an RFI form pursuant to an anonymous tip.
- PDS staff should not investigate alleged violations without a completed RFI form.
- PDS should respond to violations in order of severity, not necessarily in the order received.
- PDS should issue stop work orders for projects in violation that are under construction.
- · PDS should apply a surcharge to fees for permits resulting from code enforcement.
- PDS should provide periodic summaries of Compliance actions to the BOCC that will track compliance on all open CE cases.
- PDS should refer to a "specific date" (i.e., January 1, 2011) rather than use the form "within 60 days."
