# Making a Living Language, Not Just a Word List

# Introduction

This guide is to help anyone on their conlanging journey. It walks through how to start a constructed language (conlang) and how to make it into a living language—something that feels real and usable, not just a collection of words with a few rules.

# Foundations of Your Conlang

Your conlang is likely a human-like language, so it uses **phones** (units of sound) to convey meaning. The building blocks are **consonants** and **vowels**.

I recommend learning the **International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA)**. It helps with understanding how sounds are made and how they relate to each other. But don't rely on it for everything—it's a tool, not a rulebook.

Start with your language's **sound**. Ask yourself:

- What do you want your language to sound like?
- Harsh and throaty? Light and airy? Smooth and mellow?

A good starting point is to create a **phoneme inventory**:

- Around **15–20 consonants**
- At least **2 vowels**, ideally not more than 5 or 6 if you're thinking about long-term sound evolution

Next, decide on your syllable structure:

- English prefers CVC or CCVC, but don't let it limit you.
- Look at Slovene, Icelandic, Russian, or Irish for ideas—they allow clusters and sounds that are tricky for English speakers.
- Or even make it **simple.** Make it like Hawaiian, have all syllables be one consonant and one vowel.

# Starting Your Lexicon

You'll begin your vocabulary using the **7 Basic Words Exercise**. This helps you create a base for your grammar and syntax.

#### **How It Works**

You'll do five rounds labeled A through E. Each one asks you to invent 7+ words in specific categories. Here's the table:

#### **Instructions**

- Start with A. Don't reuse words across exercises.
- Where a suffix is added, apply it to one of the seven words to create an eighth.
- Try to make 2–3 simple sentences per exercise.
- The goal isn't logical storytelling—it's to see how your words interact and grow naturally.

# **Example**

#### A:

• Water, Wolf, Drink, Swim, in, I/me/my, big

#### B:

• Mushroom, Leaf, Root, grow, on, you/you/your, green, + -ise

#### C:

• Snake, kill, eat, bite, it/it/its, they/them/their, long, + -ing

Don't worry if the sentences are weird. This is about function, not sense!

# Writing It Out

Many guides say "create your writing system last," but you still need a way to **write your language** while building it.

### **Suggestions**

- Start with a basic Latinized orthography.
- Don't copy English spelling rules.
   Example: If you have /k/ and /ts/, use k for /k/ and c for /ts/. Later you can modify it—maybe c changes into č /t[/.

Your orthography can show **how your language changes over time**, just like how English's "ea" went from /ea/ to /i/ (like in "meat").

# Grammar

This is where your language becomes usable.

#### **Word Order**

Start by experimenting with different word orders:

- Subject-Verb-Object (SVO, like English)
- Subject-Object-Verb (SOV, like Japanese)
- Verb-Subject-Object (VSO, like Irish)

Use the words from the 7-word exercises to test how sentence structure feels in your conlang.

#### **More Grammar Help**

There are many things to decide: tense, mood, aspect, agreement, plurals, definiteness, and so much more.

# Refinement

Now it's time to refine your grammar and sound rules (phonotactics).

If you don't have a fictional world, you might skip **phonological evolution**. But I still recommend it—it adds realism.

#### **Simulating Evolution**

Let your conlang change over time:

- Keep your original words and forms
- Add new versions that feel like natural evolution

#### **Example:**

Your word for "eat" is *tua*, and your verb past tense suffix used to be -di. Over time, you create a new one, -the.

But your speakers have said *tuadi* for so long, they keep it—and *tuathe* evolves to mean something else, like "consume entirely."

These natural changes help generate tons of new vocabulary!

# Culture

Language doesn't exist in a vacuum. Think about the world of your speakers.

Ask yourself:

• What kind of **environment** do they live in?

- Do they know about things like fishing? Do they value religion?
- Is reproduction sacred? Taboo?
- Do they use **base-10 math**? Or base-12? Or base-5?

Build a culture that reflects your people, and let the language shape and be shaped by that.

# 14 Words Exercise

This is like the 7-word exercise but with more structure and reuse of existing vocabulary.

#### Choose:

- 4 Nouns
- 4 Verbs
- 2 Adpositions
- 2 Pronouns
- 2 Adjectives
- **Optional suffixes**: verbal, nominal, collective, diminutive, resultative, deficient, instrumental, perfective

This gives you a playground for testing how your grammar works with new rules and older words.

### What's Next?

A truly **naturalistic conlang** takes time. French, Russian, and Hungarian and every other non-constructed living language evolved over **thousands of years**.

Tolkien took 40+ years to build his languages. Yours will grow over time, too.

There are many more parts to explore, including:

- Numerals
- Adverbs
- Idioms
- Verb Chains
- Particles and Focus Markers
- Loanwords

There will be an extension to this guide for those features. But for now—just keep building. You're making something *alive*.

The following Lists are guidelines and possible words that are essential in an inclusive naturalistic conlang. You do not need to include every single word, but it is a good start. Some lists like the Swadesh list fail at providing words that are functional. These are meant to be optimised to help the beginning stages of a conlang.

Some words like who are not present because words that are human specific are inventions that are created later on. What is who, but non-human.

Think outside the box when reading these. Use suffixes (When I say suffixes you can make infixes, prefixes, suffixes, circumfixes, and other.)
