## **AutoCAD Projects & Grading**

- AutoCAD 1:
  - Complete the 3D name projects. Teacher will visit Kyle, Darian, Roy, Trey, and David for personalized feedback.
- AutoCAD 2:
  - Posted challenge problems focusing on circles, trimming, and extending lines.
- AutoCAD 4 (Dimensioning):
  - Now available with specific dimensioning setups. AutoCAD 3 serves as review for the upcoming test and follows AutoCAD 4.

#### **Extra Credit Puzzlers**

- A set of "whodunit" logic puzzles has been distributed as extra credit.
- Students are to work independently without discussing answers.
- Puzzles include scenarios such as:
  - Deduction of a car theft involving a jack left at the scene.
  - A case involving a dead brother and a cottage detail.
  - A boat-related scenario emphasizing that boats do not have brakes.
- Extra points have been awarded (approximately 4 points to Roy, Darian, and David; Jonathan received 6 extra credit points).

## In-Class Demonstrations & AutoCAD Techniques

## **Circle Drawing & Dimensioning**

- Multiple methods for drawing circles were covered, including center, diameter, and two-point methods.
- Specific dimension adjustments (e.g., measurements of 0.5, 0.4, points) were demonstrated to ensure precision.

 Emphasis was placed on aligning endpoints correctly, proper labeling, and overall drawing precision.

#### **Hands-On Practice**

- Demonstrations on fixing drawing issues such as repositioning and adjusting dimension lines were provided.
- Importance of adding correct numbers and labels to drawings was discussed.

## **Classroom Management & Additional Instructions**

- Attendance was taken; notes were made on tardiness and proper cell phone management (phones should stay in backpacks and not be used during instruction).
- Reminders were given to work independently and manage time effectively.
- Final remarks included humorous banter and reiterations of classroom protocols (e.g., correct phone storage and staying focused).

#### **Social & Civic Discussions**

## **Current Affairs Bell Ringer**

- A bell ringer exercise featured an article about a pregnant mother charged with assault for smoking meth.
  - Students are required to read the article and answer questions on its political implications, discussing liberal versus conservative perspectives.
  - Debate on whether punitive measures or treatment provide better outcomes, with emphasis on treatment being potentially more constructive than incarceration.

#### Research on Deterrence & Addiction

#### • Deterrence Measures:

- Discussion on the limited effectiveness of punishment (e.g., speeding tickets, theft) to prevent initial offenses.
- Comparisons between punitive and rehabilitative approaches, including their role in managing addiction and criminal behavior.

#### Addiction Issues:

- Cases illustrating that harsh punishment might worsen outcomes, such as in the case of pregnant women with meth addiction.
- Consideration of addiction as a medical issue versus a criminal issue, with debates between strict punitive responses and early intervention/rehabilitation.

#### • Societal & Policy Influences:

- Examination of how aggressive pharmaceutical advertising and doctor incentives contribute to the opioid crisis.
- Discussions on the potential for improved insurance and medical support mechanisms for those addicted through legitimate use.

## **Academic & Instructional Assignments**

## Infographic Task on Addiction & Policy

- Create an infographic that includes:
  - A historical overview of the addiction issue.
  - Insights into both liberal (emphasizing rehabilitation and early intervention) and conservative (supporting strict punitive measures) perspectives.
  - Research on current legal measures, proposed policies, or ongoing legislative debates (e.g., discussions at the federal level/White House).
- Designated work intervals are set for this task:

- Extra recognition: Chloe will be awarded 50 extra credit points upon successful completion of her task.

#### Informal & Social Context
