5 mins	Explanation of Activity:	
	Discuss briefly with students to ensure that	
	they understand what 'role shift' is. What it	
	is and how to do it. One person taking on the role of 2 people having a conversation.	
	Conversation between parent and child re breakfast:	#B Lesson 2 Food Breakfast.
	In the whole group - Practise by starting	
	with a conversation between 2 students	
	(mum and child) at the front of the group.	
	Conversation including the breakfast signs (#B Lesson 2) 'Mum' starts with	
	greetings - hello, good morning etc, Other	
	student 'child' responds with a similar	

	greeting - hello mum. Then first student (mum) asks about their breakfast - want breakfast what - Second person (child) answers e.g toast honey Mum again: - maybe cereal milk (?) Child: Yes (or no) and repeat what they want or add more. Mum: good. • Then next time, take away one person and have the same conversation again. One person uses 'role shift'. (Remember how to indicate 2 people - turn to the side, look down or up). You have to decide who is taller first! Another option, if time permits, is for the conversation to be about greeting and introducing yourself to someone. Greetings and fingerspelling names etc This may be challenging to begin, but with practice and 'having a go' it gets easier and is more fun! Once you experience it, you start to really understand what role shift in Auslan is
