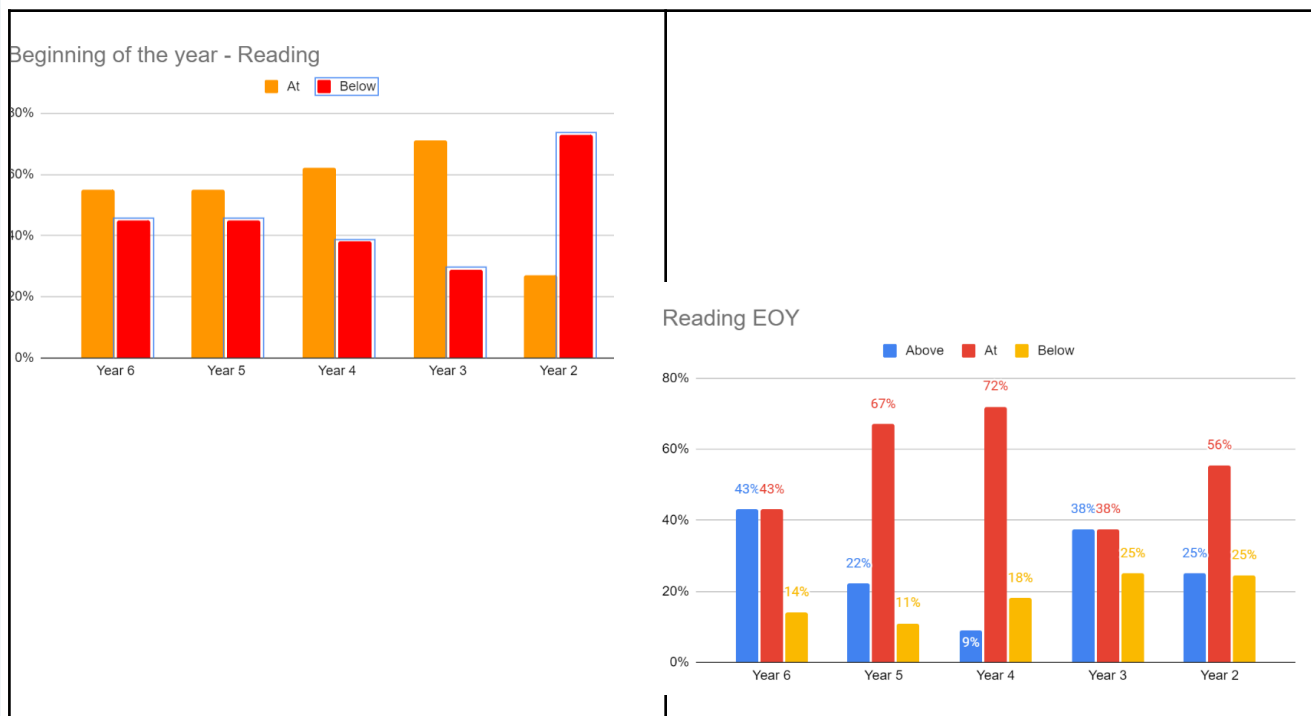
Achievement and Progress Report for Primary Students 2023

Introduction

The following events may have influence on achievement and progress for our year 1-6 students:

- illness
- weather events
- attendance

During 2023 all staff have been involved in PB4L and RF professional development. These observations and discussions provide clear evidence that relationships between primary staff and students is strong and mana enhancing.



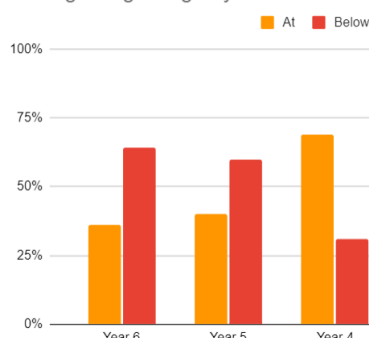
The teaching practice in primary can be described as truly effective as it has had a positive impact on student achievement since term 1.

We have a whole language approach which is based on Effective Literacy practice (MOE).

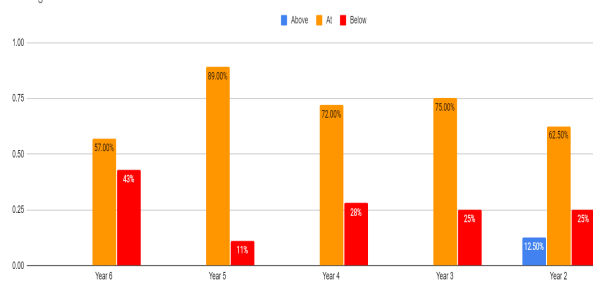
Our literacy programme starts with shared book (an essential component of the daily literacy programme) then guided instructional reading, and also includes phonological awareness, working

with sounds and letters, independent reading and reading aloud. Effective literacy practice covers the 3 aspects of literacy which are oral, reading and writing. Consistency throughout primary has been integral to success. Junior classroom reading rockets have proven to be a great interactive assessment aid, students move their name up the levels of the rocket after running records show they have progressed. Those students who are reporting as below have extra support in place such as RT Lit, Reading Recovery or Senco. Students who are currently on the Reading Recovery Programme have already had referrals put through to RTLit, as Reading Recovery will not continue next year.

Writing - Beginning of year

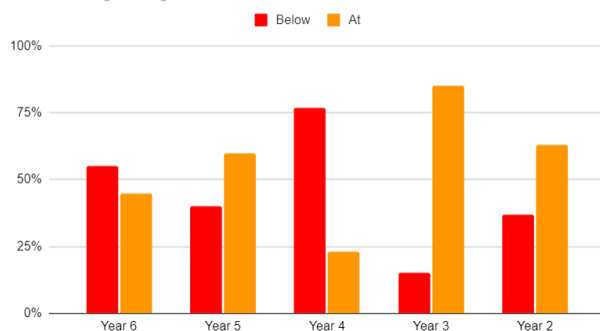


Writing End of Year

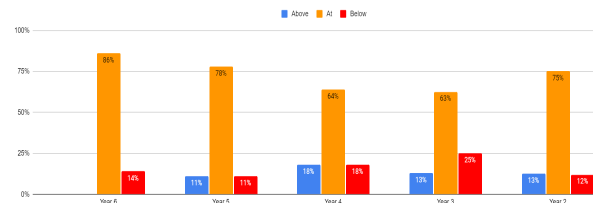


This year the focus has been on writing in the primary school. Professional development with Sheena Cameron and using her resources has been a positive inclusion into the writing programme. Consistent approach throughout the primary due to expertise and guidance of our Classroom Specialist teacher. Many of our students are reluctant writers and this programme has provided new and engaging ways to motivate them. This is a national trend in schools across the country. The writing results shown here highlight positive movement in all year levels. These students have been working with RtLit and will roll over into 2024. This curriculum area will need to be a focus for accelerated learning for this cohort.

The maths data provided shows an improvement across all year levels. Staff use PACT and GLOSS as assessment tools. It is particularly pleasing to see increased numbers (55% across the primary) in students achieving above-expected levels. The primary staff have participated in moderation across the different aspects of PACT judgments. This will need to be continued into next year as there are new staff coming into the team and to ensure consistency there needs to be continued moderation. Next year we have a advisor who will be supporting with this and also to implement the new curriculum.

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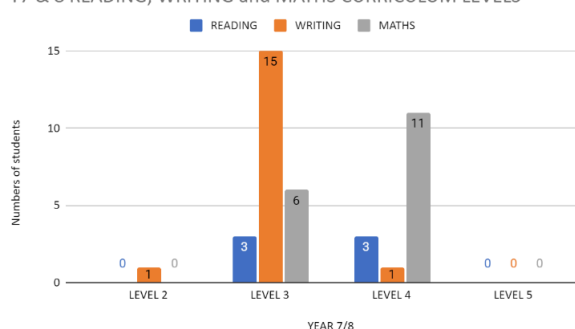

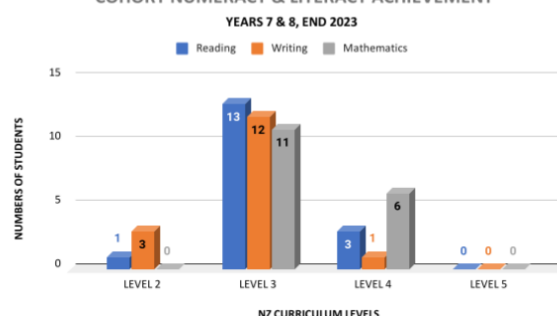
Assessment data is considered fair and representative of what students can do most of the time, independently and by themselves. Teachers made overall teacher judgments using the Progress and Achievement Consistency Tool (PaCT) for Reading, Writing, and Mathematics. Judgments are best made using a range of sources:

- Standardized tools- like PAT Maths (Progress and Achievement Test), STAR (Supplementary Test of Achievement in Reading), and e Asttle
- Non-standardized tools such as Basic Facts testing, Probe Running records.
- Students' bookwork

Y7 & 8 READING, WRITING and MATHS CURRICULUM LEVELS



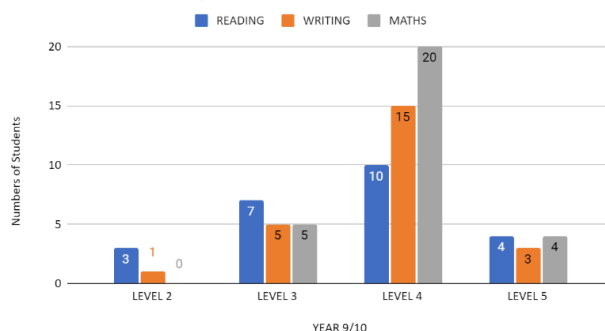
COHORT NUMERACY & LITERACY ACHIEVEMENT



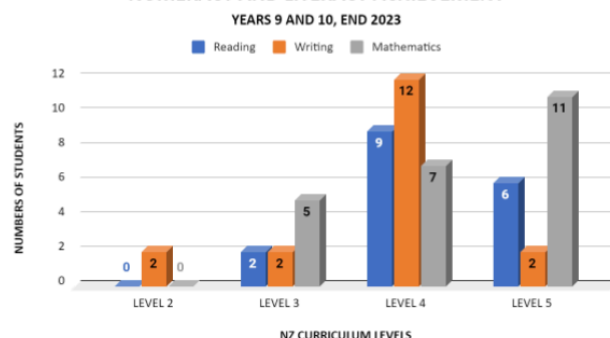
Analysis of Year 7 & 8 Cohort Achievement and Progress

- At the end of 2023 for Reading: 6% of Year 7 & 8 students are achieving in Curriculum Level 2 (cf 0% at Mid year); 81% are achieving in Curriculum Level 3 (cf 50% at Mid year); and 18% are achieving in Curriculum Level 4 (cf 17% at Mid year).
- At the end of 2023, for Writing: 18% of Year 7 & 8 students are achieving in level 2 (cf 6% at Mid year); 70% are achieving in Curriculum Level 3 (cf 88% at Mid year); and 18% at Level 4 (cf 6% at Mid Year).
- At the end of 2023 for Mathematics: 65% of Year 7 & 8 students are achieving in Curriculum Level 3 (cf 35% at Mid Year) and 35% are achieving at Curriculum Level 4 (cf 65% at mid year).

Analysis of Year 9-10 Cohort Achievement and Progress

- At the end of 2023 for Reading: 0% of Year 9 & 10 students are achieving in Curriculum Level 2 (cf 17 % at Mid year); 12% are achieving in Curriculum Level 3 (cf 21% at Mid year); 66% are achieving in Curriculum Level 4 (cf 59 % at Mid year); and 35% are achieving in Curriculum Level 5 (cf 24% at Mid year).
- At the end of 2023, for Writing: 11 % of Year 9 & 10 students are achieving in Curriculum level 2 (cf 4% at Mid year); 11 % are achieving in Curriculum Level 3 (cf 21% at Mid year); 66% at Level 4 (cf 63% at Mid Year); and 11% are achieving in Curriculum Level 5 (cf 12.5% at Mid Year).
- At the end of 2023 for Mathematics: 22% of Year 9 & 10 students are achieving in Curriculum Level 3 (cf 21% at Mid Year) ; 30% are achieving at Curriculum Level 4 (cf 83% at mid year); and 48% of Year 9 & 10 students achieve in Curriculum Level 5 (cf 14% at Mid year).

In comparison to the first half of the year and teacher resourcing problems in the Year 7 and 8 area, for most of Term 3, and for Term 4, students more settled and engaged in their learning. Acknowledgement must be given to the team of teachers who looked after the Year 7 & 8 students in Term 3, while their regular teacher was on leave. For Year 9 and 10 students, the combined English and Mathematics classes were split in Term 3, enabling teachers to better prepare Year 10 students for the NCEA co-requisite CAA in Term 4, as well as addressing the needs of every student.

Overall a strong and consistent focus by all teachers on classroom learning programmes and positive behaviours for learning has contributed to the majority of students being switched on to success.

This end of year Achievement and Progress report examines the success of students who were here both at the beginning and end of the year.

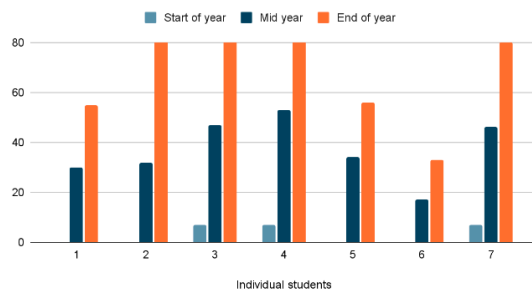

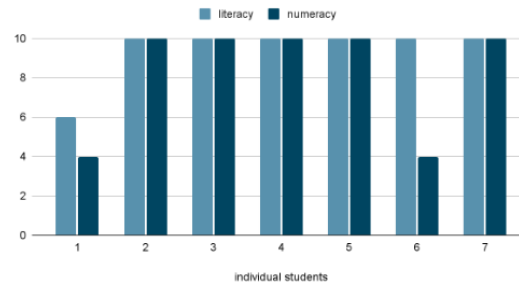

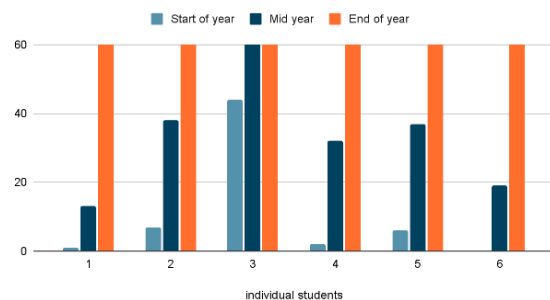

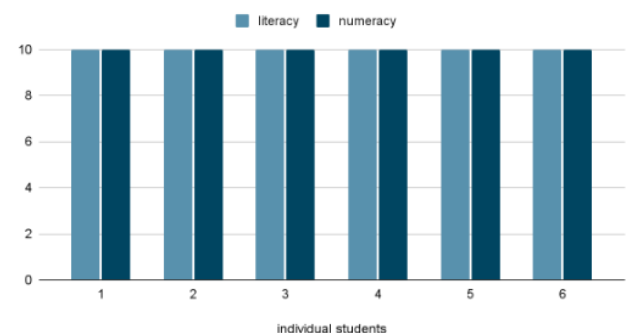
- 4 students successfully completed NCEA Level 1.

Lit/ Num achievement

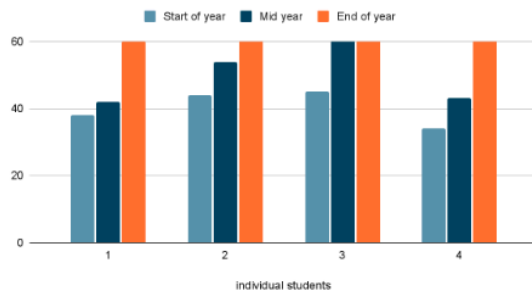

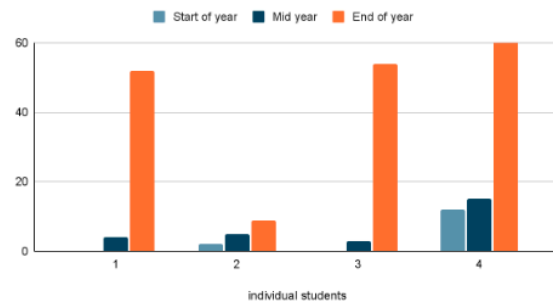
- 50% of this cohort did not gain NCEA Level 1 in 2022.

EDUCATION

Many returns

A small Far North school's library is a focal point for its community.

There are around 130 on the roll at Opononi Area School, which has pupils from Year 1-13. A decile-one institution under the old regime, it is in the Te Tai Tokerau region, which has received a large increase in financial support under the new equity index system.

Despite challenges, for several years its pupils have had access to a comfortable, spacious and an unusually well-stocked library, thanks most recently to the energy and devotion of Roma Scott, who also uses the 216 sq m of space to give one-to-one tuition to readers who need help.

As well as serving the school in which it is housed, the library of about 11,300 books is run as a community facility, which means other Hokianga residents can use it. "Sometimes, we have people who are doing a paper at university," says Scott. "Some are just using it for relaxation. I've had about 10 different people using the library regularly other than the children."

The books come from a variety of sources. "Some are donated by parents. We've got a range, really."

That includes a small area for preschool books. "Sometimes, parents come in for an

interview or a meeting and they leave the little ones in here. So we have books for them, too."

Scott also makes good use of the National Library service: "At the moment our Year 12 and 13 have just got a new pack of books for the term, and when they are returned I can order another set. Our middle school or top primary school might be doing projects on countries, or native birds. If I haven't got enough books on those, I can request some from the National Library, which is so easy. And then, for the younger ones, we have the Duffy Books – we are pretty well covered."

Which is probably just as well, since there is little cash to spend on books.

"My budget is \$1500 a year at the moment for the whole school. If I buy something for the junior side, then later in the year I may buy some for Years 5 and 6. And then, the following year, it will be mostly senior school, new fiction or nonfiction."

"If the odd book comes up and they really, really want it, I'll have a look at my budget, and sometimes I buy books myself because I think some of our students will enjoy reading that one."

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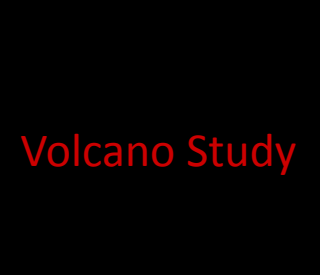
