Indent the subsequent paragraphs throughout. The article should be typed using Times New Roman, size 11pt, 1.5 lines spacing, and submitted in docx or doc format. The article does not exceed 4.500 words, including References (excluding abstracts). Either British or American English spelling

Graphs created with Microsoft Excel should also be sent in their original Excel file. Present graphs in 2D (not 3D), without shadows or other effects, and without gridlines.

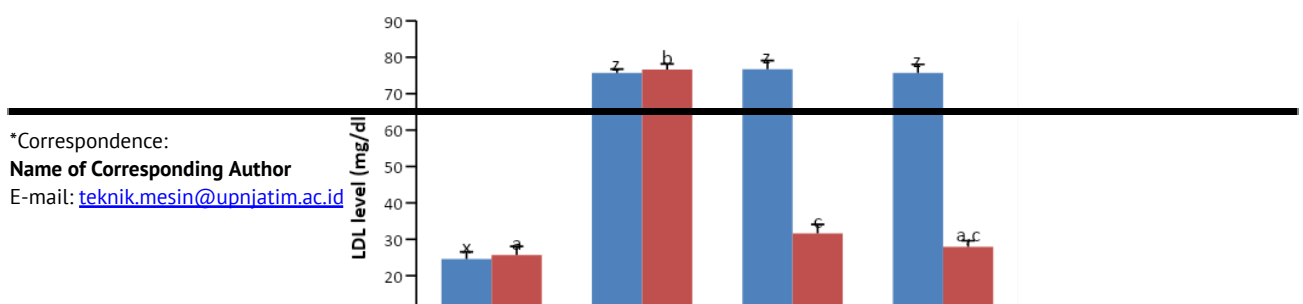


Figure 6. LDL level pre-test and post-test. Different notation shows significant differences ($p < 0.05$). K0: control; K-: negative; EBF1: extract 1; EBF 2: extract 2.
