Artist Workshop and Performance



Experience the power of music like never before with the WCM Artist Workshop and Performance

Program, presented in collaboration with the STEAM Fund. Designed for students in grades 2–12, this dynamic initiative brings professional WCM artists directly into schools—or transports students to vibrant public venues—to engage in unforgettable

live performances and hands-on workshops. These events don't just showcase music—they unpack it, allowing students to physically, intellectually, and emotionally step inside the music through interactive, collaborative creation.

Each 30-minute workshop is crafted to turn listening into an active, creative process. Students clap rhythms, sing melodies, act out musical forms, and build soundscapes with instruments and found objects—all grounded in the stylistic and cultural worlds of the music they'll experience live. The goal? To connect music to the broader world: history, civics, science, and beyond. With input from classroom teachers, our teaching artists tailor each experience to spark curiosity and creativity, foster critical listening, and show students that music isn't just something you hear—it's something you feel, build, and live.

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Improvisation For Everyone



wcm's Improvisation For Everyone
program —offered in partnership with the
STEAM Fund—is a joyful, deeply engaging
introduction to musical creativity, designed
for students from PreK through 12th grade.
Rooted in collaboration and guided
exploration, this program makes
improvisation accessible to all students, no
matter their musical background. Whether
using classroom instruments, found objects,
or just their voices and bodies, students learn

to build entire pieces of music together in real time—no scripts, no wrong answers, just attentive listening and imaginative response.

The workshops prioritize empathy, focus, and group connection as students respond to each other's musical gestures through rhythm, tone, and expressive play. By working in a fully inclusive and democratic creative space, they gain confidence, develop sharper listening skills, and experience firsthand the emotional range and expressive power of music. From call-and-response to full-class soundscapes, students are invited into a process that is equal parts serious and joyful—one that helps them hear and be heard in new ways.





Making An Opera Residency Program

WCM's Making an Opera program, presented in collaboration with the STEAM Fund, is a six-week residency that invites students in grades 4–12 to dive into the creative process of building an opera from scratch. Guided by a professional composer and teaching artists, students will explore what opera really is—its music, drama, storytelling,



and cultural context—before collaboratively crafting an original work of their own. From choosing the story and writing the libretto, to developing musical ideas and staging the final performance, every step is shaped by the students' voices, ideas, and creativity.

During the residency, whether working in small groups or large ensembles, students take ownership of the process in a way that connects deeply across disciplines—writing can range from full productions with costumes and sets to simple staged readings, the heart of the project is always the same: student-led storytelling brought to life through music. It's an ambitious, joyful, and truly collaborative journey that turns young creators into composers, librettists, directors, and performers—all at once.
