TPS is a major movement supported by the Library of Congress across the United States and, also, by the California H-SS Project. Some documents are legal agreement like treaties, such as agreements made with native peoples. Other items are cultural like jazz music from the 1920s. I've even seen love letters from soldiers written in the Civil War or World War II.

Indexed collections of important and interesting documents, images, music, etc., are growing in the Library of Congress as a way for educators to work together to develop cutting edge activities for students of various grade levels. The effort to make these materials available to teachers has grown rapidly in recent years. It is now incredibly rich.

TPS is an online social media network hosted for by the Library of Congress for teachers to connect with colleagues via social media, discuss strategies for teaching with primary sources, enrich technology to enhance learning, interact and get ideas from other teachers, and enrich students' questions and responses to increase understanding. You will meet many new friends across America and become part of a valuable support group.

ESRI K-12 Teacher Video Challenge

As you probably already know, ESRI (Environmental Systems Research Institute, inc., located in Redlands) is an international leader in applying geographic information technology to analyze a range of data to solve a major problem. ESRI is impressed by and wants to showcase the hard work and creativity of K-12 teachers using ArcGIS Online. ESRI is holding a monthly video challenge. Use the video to show viewers the powerful things you do!

For example, as a result of political discourse for and against social issues of concern to diverse populations in California and the rest of the U.S., tensions in many communities have risen. The issues are generally discussed in history-social science and ELA classrooms. It is important that teachers and administrators have strategies and tools to discuss controversial issues in a manner that de-escalates tensions and seeks common ground.

Stanford History Education Group offering FREE webinars and materials!

In 'Reading Like a Historian', 'Beyond the Bubble Assessments', and 'Civic Online Reasoning' webinars, students to learn and practice skills like 'lateral reading', in which students compare websites and other social media posts on the same issue. They learn to determine which are are valid...and which are not. Students learn how to ask 'who created this', 'for what purpose', 'who benefits', 'who paid for this', 'what evidence is presented', when they read articles especially on (but not limited to) social media. Included are many resources and lessons, including documents, that students analyze the same way.

The 'Beyond the Bubble' assessments are similar to short document based questions. Here students are presented with several articles and asked to determine validity and accuracy, article or website is after comparing to other sources. These assessments include the documents and rubrics, and are in US and World history.

An ethnic group that has made a major mark here in California is celebrated in schools and communities from September 15th-through October 15th. 
