[OPEN 2020](#) asks:

Could *ALL* the groups that are developing platform co-op, new economy and commons building projects, come together to create an online event where we collectively figure out:

How to enable small groups to form, exchange ideas, define shared purposes, to collaborate effectively, and trade – within a global network of like minded commons building initiatives?

Amy Hulme - social change agency

They have an onboarding process.

- most groups already have a collective decision-making process
- groups must have at least three “admin” people

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Xavier - OC is “reducing friction” for small groups and communities

Transparency of the accounting increases trust

Oliver: does the Open Collective have any tools to help with governance and collective decision-making?

- Depends on the size and other factors
- The platform provides transparency
- All the expenses and approval is public

Oliver: Is there a requirement generally on administrative requirements?

- It depends on the fiscal host

What is a “fiscal host”?

- a legal entity that is hosting the other entities.
- An interface between the 20th C bureaucracy and new projects
- recall the analogy with web servers – people don’t have to do it all themselves

Amy: at the start of the pandemic they committed to offering free services. Fees are paid when interactions are on the platform. Social Change Agency has funding from elsewhere.

Xavier: Foundations of public authorities are the right people to fund the infrastructure.

Oliver: technical question: you can create a ‘goal’ and ‘donation button’. Can you integrate the facilities on your own site? Yes.

Filipa: The funders – can they at some point ask for something that the group considers confidential? Say if they were developing new technology...

Xavier: example of facilitator collective.

Filipa: imagine a group of engineers that would want to develop a piece of technology to share (e.g. environmentally friendly portable homes, to provide at very low price to 3rd world countries) but were worried that before that this piece of technology would be finished it would be patented (by one of the private funders) before it was finished?

Amy: people use OC so that people don’t have to do the financial side
