Classical Studies: Roman Civilization

MR. ROCKWELL---ROOM 205

This course will introduce students to the world of ancient Rome, a civilization that lasted over a thousand years and left a lasting legacy in Europe and large parts of Africa and Asia. The semester will begin with Rome's origins and proceed through various thematic units including civic duty, Stoicism, and leisure, among other things. In each unit, students will read about Roman history, culture, and legacy paired with readings from Roman literature.
