Accountable: The True Story of a Racist Social Media Account and the Teenagers Whose Lives It Changed

by Dashka Slater (non-fiction, Project LIT) In 2017, a Korean American high school junior in Albany, California, created a "private" Instagram account through which he posted racist and sexist memes in an attempt to get a few laughs from his original 13 followers. Instead, he hurt a whole community.



<u>Dreams From Many Rivers: A Hispanic History of the United States Told in Poems</u> by Margarita Engle, illustrated by Beatriz Gutierrez Hernandez (poetry) Through a collection of illustrations and free-verse poems voicing both fictional and historical LatinX narratives, this book presents more than 500 years of indigenous and Hispanic American history, from pre-Columbian times to the present.



Dry by Neal Shusterman and Jarrod Shusterman (science fiction, dystopian fiction)

When California is hit with an extended drought dubbed the "Tap Out," 16-year-old Alyssa and her brother must partner with their neighbor Kelton and others to search for water and a chance at survival. As people start to turn against each other amid apocalyptic doom, will they persevere?



<u>Hidden Systems: Water, Electricity, the Internet, and the Secrets Behind the Systems We Use Every Day</u> by Dan Nott (non-fiction, graphic novel) A hidden system, or "something we don't notice until it breaks," brings benefits but at what cost? This book explains, in graphic detail (literally), three components of our infrastructure and how they work, along with how they help humanity but also cause harm.



Kaiju No. 8, Vol. 1 by Naoya Matsumoto (manga)

Kaiju, Godzilla-like monsters, plague Japan and Kafka aspires to join the heroic defense force that battles them. Instead, he is relegated to the cleanup crew responsible for dismantling slain kaiju. When he acquires the ability to transform parts of his body to kaiju parts, he gets a second chance.



Love in English by Maria E. Andreu (fiction, romance)

Ana, having moved from Argentina to New Jersey, has enough to worry about between navigating a new culture, a new language, and new family dynamics. Before long, she must also navigate a love triangle between herself, an American in 1st period math, and a Greek Cypriot in 2nd period ESL.



A Million to One by Abida Jaigirdar (historical fiction, LGBTQ+)

What do you get when Irish, Croatian, Haitian, and Pakistani teens from an all-girls boarding school in Dublin board the Titanic? A fast-paced historical heist in which a troupe of talented thieves attempt to steal a bejeweled copy of the *Rubaiyat*, a priceless book of Persian poetry.



Promise Boys by Nick Brooks (thriller/mystery, Project LIT)

After the principal of Urban Promise Prep School in DC is shot and killed during a basketball game, three teens of color – J.B., Ramon, and Trey, who were serving an unsupervised detention at the time of the murder, become key suspects and must investigate the crime to clear their names.



The Voting Booth by Brandy Colbert (fiction, romance)

When ambivalent Duke is turned away at the voting booth due to a registration mix-up, activist Marva makes it her personal mission to ensure he votes in the election. Between light and flirty interactions and tackling significant social and personal issues, they grow closer throughout the day.



What Storm, What Thunder by Myriam J.A. Chancy (adult fiction, One Maryland One Book)
In this fictional account of the devastating 2010 earthquake in Haiti, 10 people connected through Ma Lou, a market woman and community staple, share their personal grief and trauma, exacerbated by systemic social failures, as they navigate recovery in the aftermath of a natural disaster.
