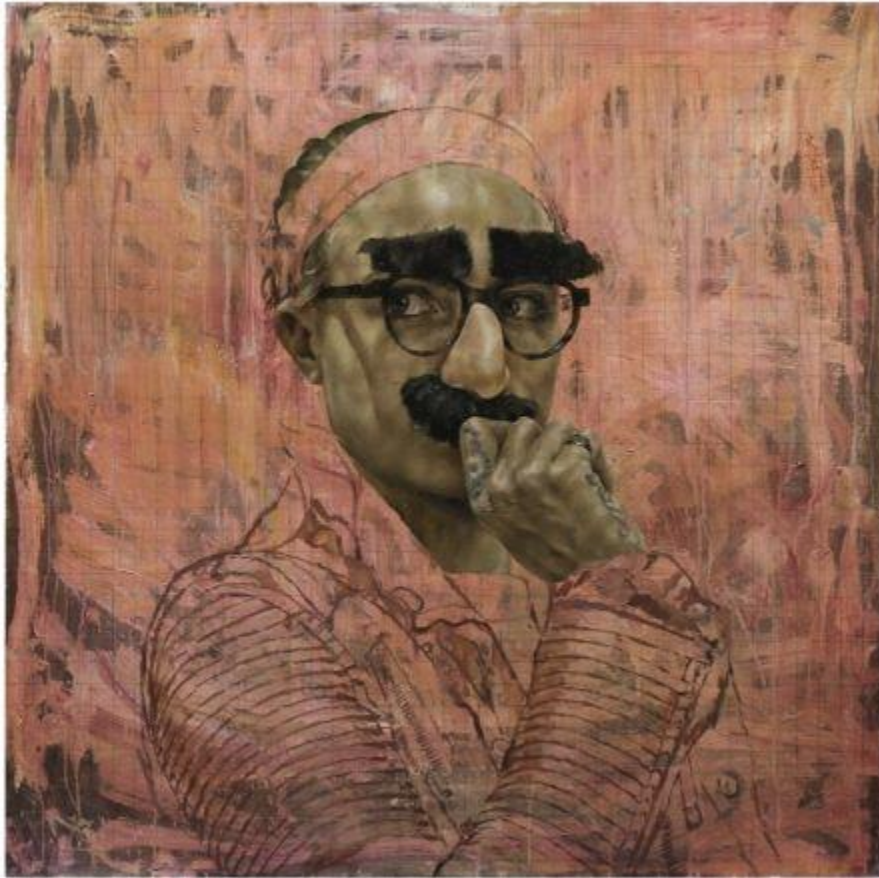

In a prison where most men spend 22 hours a day locked in cells, Music in the Ville brings light, humanity and connection through weekly live music. ***Jonathan Yeo**, born 1970, is one of the world's leading figurative artists. He has painted and worked with iconic and celebrated figures, including King Charles III, Sir David Attenborough, peace activist Malala Yousafzai, actors Dennis Hopper, Nicole Kidman and Idris Elba, artists Damien Hirst and Grayson Perry, supermodel and actor Cara Delevingne, Baroness Doreen Lawrence, former Prime Minister Tony Blair, and has produced official commissions of Prince Philip and Queen Elizabeth. His work has been exhibited widely in museums and galleries around the world and has been the subject of several major retrospectives in the UK and internationally.*

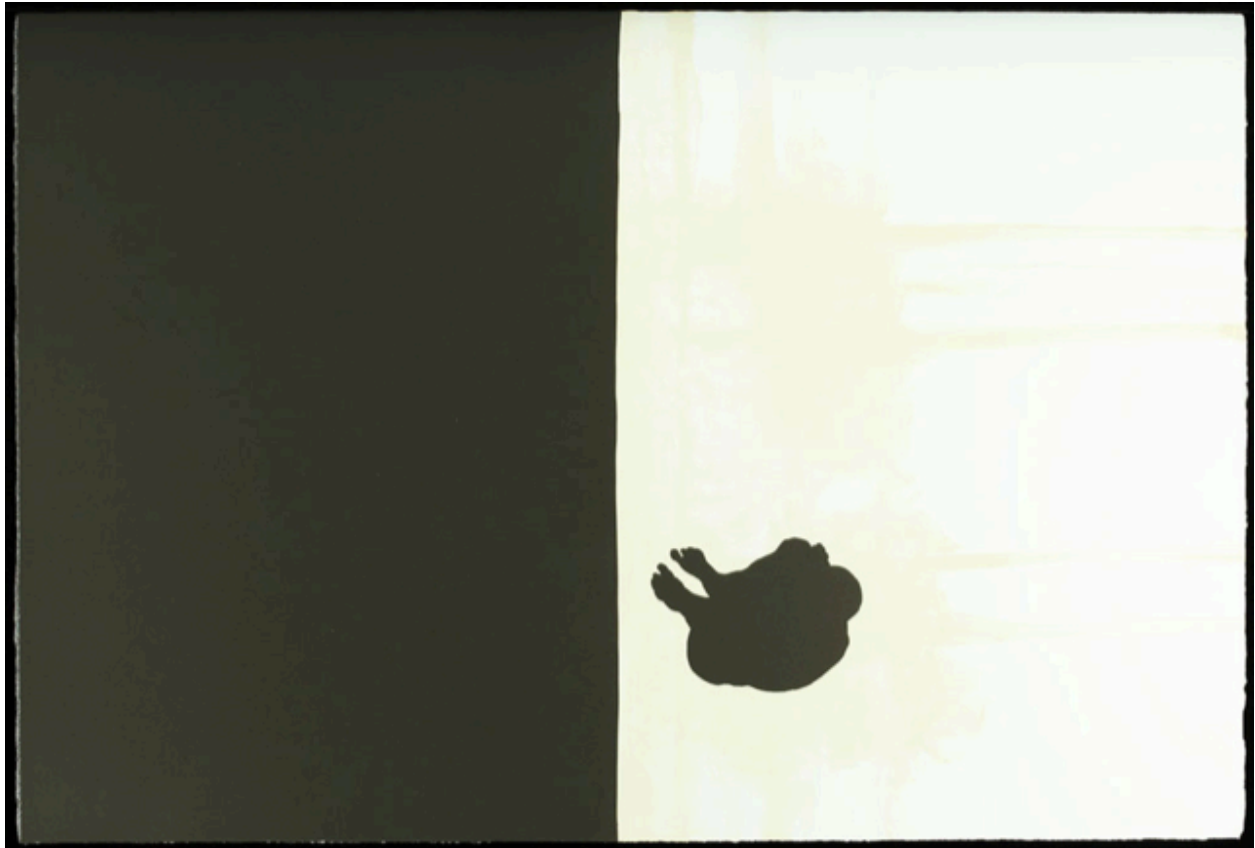

**'No Music on a Dead Planet' 2020.** Signed and dated front right-hand corner. Pencil and pen on paper 285 x 370mm. Framed: 360 x 470mm (white float mount, museum glass). An original drawing by the artist, created in 2020 for the organisation Music Declares Emergency, which reproduced the image on a fundraising T-shirt. The work incorporates references to death metal iconography, depicting the Earth as a skull. Beneath the skull, the crossed bones are replaced with guitars, creating a visual fusion of environmental activism and rock culture. The composition also alludes to the iconic Stoned Again graphic by Robert Crumb from the 1970s, reinterpreting its countercultural aesthetic through a contemporary ecological lens. Estimate to come.

**Gavin Turk**, born 1967, was considered to be one of the Young British Artists, a group of artists who exhibited together in the 1990s. He pioneered many forms of contemporary British sculpture, including rubbish art. His work is held within public and private collections worldwide, including the Tate and the Museum of Modern Art New York.

## **Antony Gormley**

**Antony Gormley**, born 1950, is Britain's leading sculptor. He is best known for his work with human forms, created chiefly from casts of his own naked body. One of his most famous works is the Angel of the North, a public sculpture in Gateshead in the north of England. In 2019 the Royal Academy held a major exhibition of his work filling all its 13 galleries with his sculptures. He won the Turner Prize in 1994. Last year he was appointed a Companion of Honour in the birthday Honours by King Charles III.

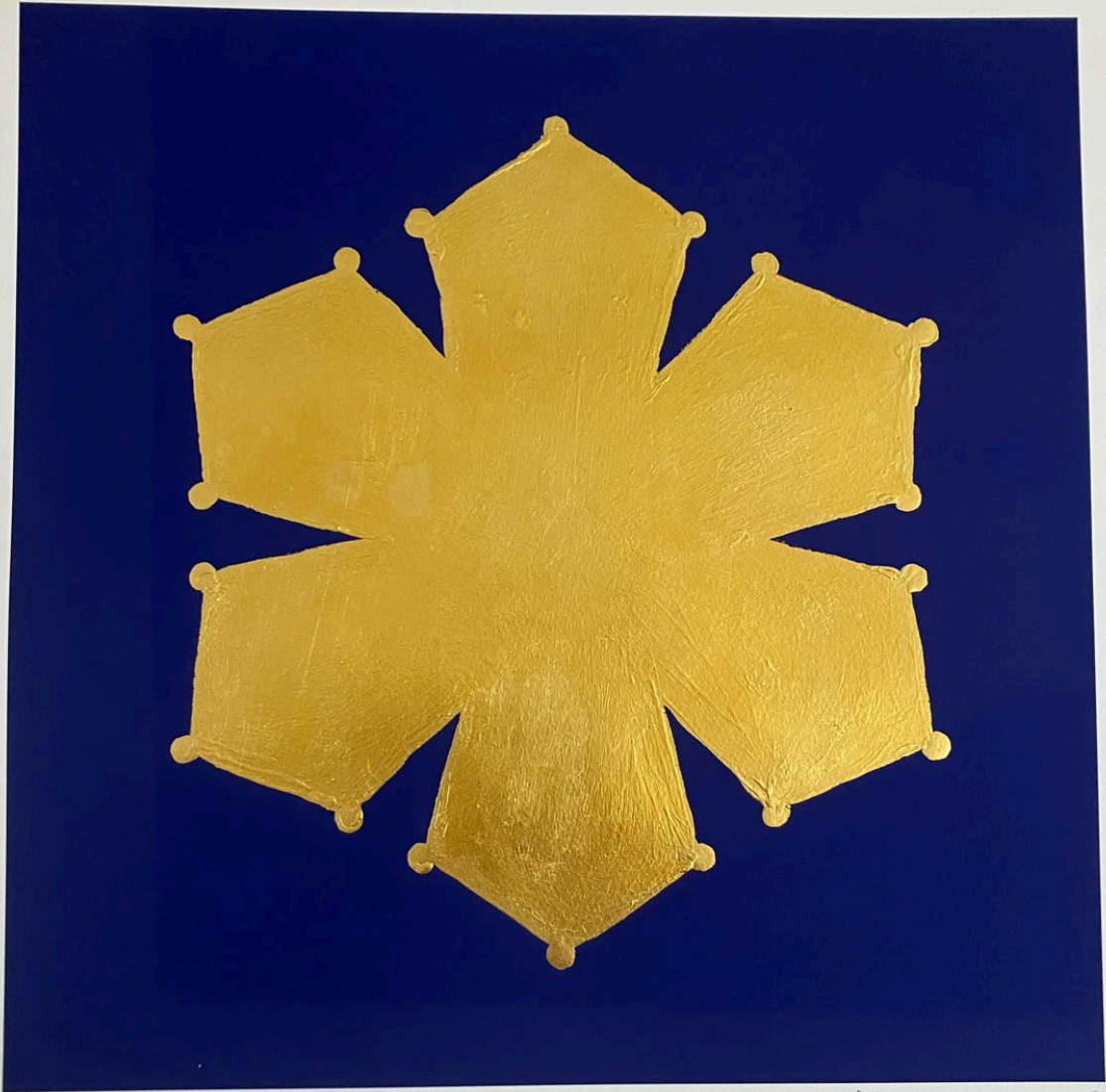
***Sir Grayson Perry**, born 1960, is one of Britain's most celebrated artists. He is also a writer, broadcaster, performer, drag act and singer who often appears in public dressed as a woman. He is most famous for his ceramic vases in classical forms, decorated in bright colours, depicting subjects often at odds with their attractive appearance. There is a strong autobiographical element in his work. His most recent solo exhibition 'Delusions of Grandeur' was held at the Wallace Collection last year.*

**Nicola Green** (born 1972) is a British portrait painter, social historian and public speaker. Her subjects have included the Dalai Lama, Barack Obama and Diana, Princess of Wales. Green gained global recognition for her project 'In Seven Days...' hailed by The Metropolitan Museum of Art as "an artistic and historic masterpiece". In 2018 she was commissioned by the owners of a new hotel, created out of the old New Scotland Yard building, to produce a series of works to reflect the history of the building. In researching crime and punishment Green discovered intricate floor plans of the 19th century Millbank Prison. The 6-point pentagram shape of the prison was designed so that all inmates would be seen at all times. The Millbank Prison Plan prints represent the severity of Victorian prisons. Nicola Green is married to David Lammy, Deputy Prime Minister since 2025.

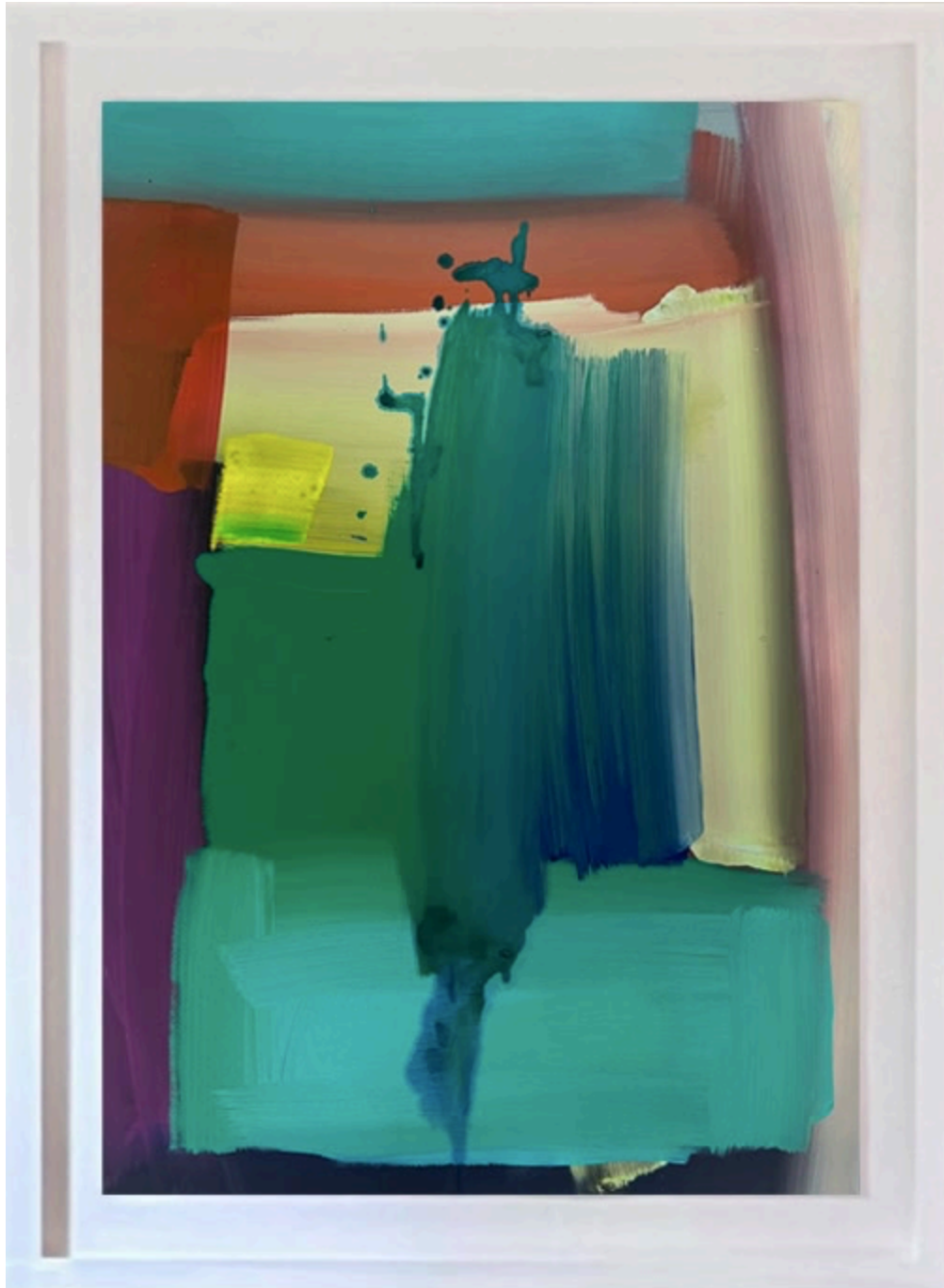
## Ralph Steadman

***Ralph Steadman**, born 1936 in Wales, is most famous for his satirical political cartoons. He is also an illustrator and has collaborated with many children's authors over his 60-year career. In 2012 a film of his life and influences, called *For No Good Reason*, premiered at the Toronto Film Festival to critical acclaim. Ralph is still drawing and producing art today, working regularly for the *New Statesman*, *The Independent* and the *New York Observer*, as well as working on his own projects. He is a maverick and trail blazer whose art inspires and influences artists today.*

**Ptolemy Mann**

***Ptolemy Mann** (born 1972) is known for intricate Bauhaus-inspired textile pieces made on a loom. From afar, their gradient-filled abstract weavings appear to be colour-field paintings. Her works range from wall-mounted works to functional objects and are made from cotton that she*

*hand-dyes. Her painterly works often aim to transform their surroundings, and she has produced many site-specific pieces. Among these is a 2019 commission for Tate Modern that is permanently installed at the museum's restaurant. In addition to her work as a commercial textile designer, Mann also paints on paper to further explore the emotional pull and soothing potential of colour.*

## **Charles Williams**

**Charles Williams** (born 1965) is a painter and writer, founding member of the Stuckist art group and a member of the New English Art Club. He exhibits his work in London, Europe and the USA, and has published 'Basic Drawing: How To Draw What You See' and the follow-up, 'Basic Watercolour'. As a painter he works in oil, watercolour, bronze, ceramics and graphic mediums. His interests are in the figurative, narrative tradition. His recent works see a flight from his usual depictions of people and rather focus on animals. Williams's works try to explain animals through their relationships with us, exploring the belief that our encounters with them are always doomed to be one-sided and that the relationships are metaphorical, allegorical and analogical.

## **Andy Aitchinson**

**Andy Aitchinson** became a documentary photographer in 1994 covering social, justice and environmental stories and campaigns. He works for a wide range of clients, from community-based organisations, charities and NGOs to philanthropic foundations. He regularly has his work published in some of the world's leading news titles. Recent assignments range from highlighting the challenges of child trafficking across the Nepal India border, and subsistence livelihoods in the Albanian mountain, to documenting Royalty-attended award ceremonies in London. Previous roles as a picture editor and photographic agent have helped him understand what makes an image stand out. 'I don't hide behind the camera – I engage with my subjects quickly to develop an empathic understanding of their situation and put them at ease which results in unique access and stronger images.'
