The Principle Approach

Noah Webster Academy bases its instruction on the Principle Approach®, an educational method developed by the Foundation for American Christian Education (FACE). By teaching students to reason from Scripture and apply God’s principles to all subjects, the Principle Approach equips them to engage with knowledge as their own, liberated from secular ideologies.

Inspired by the research of Rosalie J. Slater and Verna M. Hall, the Principle Approach is founded on seven Biblical principles ingrained in the character of America’s forefathers. It utilizes

the 4 R's of Research, Reason, Relate and Record, to produce curricula that is both Christian and American, empowering students to become reflective, independent thinkers with the ability to lead and govern themselves.

The Principle Approach encourages educators to engage in self-re-education, shifting from progressive methods that promote relativism to a Biblical model of reasoning and scholarship. This process includes mastering the FACE syllabus, starting with *The Providential Teaching of America's History*, and developing a deep understanding of America's Christian heritage in government, education, and character. Through this approach, Noah Webster Academy seeks to inspire students to exemplify Christ-like scholarship in all areas of life.

The Principle Approach® is more than just an educational method—it is a way of thinking. Mastering the Principle Approach® takes time, as it is cultivated through the disciplined study of Scripture. God's principles must first be internalized before they can manifest in the outward expressions of the soul. True restoration begins in our minds. As Colossians 3:2 instructs, "**Set your mind on things above, not on things on the earth.**"

The Seven Principles of Liberty

Mastery of the seven principles of Liberty, as defined by FACE founders Rosalie J. Slater and Verna M. Hall in their works *Teaching and Learning America's Christian History*, *The Principle Approach* and *The Christian History of the Constitution*, is fundamental to the Principle Approach®. These principles are integrated into every subject and grade, cultivating reasoning and writing skills in both teachers and students. These seven principles have been adapted for NWA:

1. **The Principle of Individuality:** *God created us in His image and has blessed His children with the gift of life and the freedom to choose. He has given each of us unique talents and abilities to fulfill our individual purpose in life.*

2. **The Principle of Christian Self-Government:** *God's children are responsible for governing themselves according to God's Word and moral principles. True freedom comes from internal self-discipline, accountability to God, and the ability to control one's own actions, thoughts, and behaviors in alignment with biblical values not by external forces.*

3. **The Principle of Christian Character:** *True character is rooted in a relationship with God and reflected in moral integrity, with virtues of honesty, kindness, and humility. Character should be shaped and guided by biblical truths through the example of Jesus Christ.*

4. **Conscience is the Most Sacred Property:** *Each individual has the God-given right and responsibility to live in accordance to God's word, in accordance to their conscience. God's children have a sacred stewardship over the moral compass, which gives direction and guidance in one's life.*

5. **The Christian Form of Government:** *Christian government is established to protect the rights given by God, ensuring that everyone is accountable to Him and has the freedom to develop and express Christian character. This form of government derives its authority from individuals who govern themselves according to God's principles. When individuals are God-governed first, then they restrain themselves from exercising inappropriate power over other people. Christian government maintains internal restraints such as representation, separation of powers, and federalism, which are modeled in the American form of government. God holds men accountable for their acts in relation to government, both in the making and in the administering of laws.*

6. **How the Seed of Local Self-Government is Planted:** *God has commanded us to love our neighbor as ourselves. As followers of Christ, we are called to promote and safeguard the right of self-government for all people. Decisions made at the most personal or local level help to preserve both liberty and accountability.*

7. **The Principle of American Political Union:** *The purpose of God's plan of*

happiness is to help us become united with Him, our families, and our fellowmen. This unity brings complete liberty and joy. By uniting with God and His word, followers of Christ fulfill their divine potential to carry out God's will. Coming together under a Christian form of government fosters civic, economic, and personal liberty for individuals and families, while strengthening the community as a whole.

The Notebook Method: The Tool of the Principle Approach®

Notebook-based learning is an educational strategy that emphasizes the disciplined use of notebooks as tools to accomplish the major steps of deep learning: research, reason, relate and record. The notebook method serves as a pathway to significant intellectual and spiritual growth. Rooted in the Principle Approach®, it seeks to cultivate a Biblical worldview and Christian character by encouraging students to reflect more deeply on their learning in a structured and deliberate way.

Unlike workbooks and the like, which often promote rote learning, notebook-based learning fosters deep thinking, mastery of the subject matter, and personal ownership of acquired knowledge. It involves creating detailed, handwritten records of study, which not only solidify comprehension, but also serve as lasting resources for further learning and reflection.

Throughout history, many influential figures have kept notebooks, recognizing their value for personal growth and creativity and serving as the process through which the natural steps to learning could be effectively accomplished. Thomas Jefferson meticulously recorded ideas and insights that influenced the founding of a nation. Leonardo da Vinci filled his notebooks with sketches, inventions, and observations that shaped the Renaissance. Alex de Tocqueville, Ludwig van Beethoven, Mark Twain, Benjamin Franklin, Ralph Waldo Emerson, and Lewis and Clark are just a few more of the world’s most influential people who demonstrated how notebooks can capture the essence of learning application, while fostering clarity, continuity, and creativity.

A survey of American history readily reveals that men of great character often share common elements in their educational backgrounds: training in Biblical reasoning, rigorous academic discipline, emphasis on languages and mathematics, and the use of the notebook method of study. The mastery of any subject requires the learner to create a written record of their study, and the more detailed and precise the record, the greater the mastery attained. The notebook becomes an indispensable instrument for reasoning and intellectual discipline.

In stark contrast to workbooks—which demand minimal reflective thinking, mastery of subject matter, or personal effort—the Notebook Approach fosters:

Oversight

A Board of Directors directs and oversees the affairs of Noah Webster Academy. Future members of the board will be selected depending upon the specific needs of the school, as determined by the Board. It is anticipated that “the Board” will consist solely of experienced teachers who have a solid testimony of Jesus Christ and a desire to help fulfil the mission of the school.

Resolving Conflicts

Our approach to conflict resolution is grounded in biblical principles, specifically Matthew 18, which provides a clear process for addressing concerns. To maintain trust and integrity, we encourage open, direct communication and a commitment to unity.

2. **Involve a member of the Board of Directors:** If the issue remains unresolved after direct communication, request a meeting with an individual member of the Board of Directors to facilitate a productive discussion.
3. **Escalate to the Full Board of Directors:** Should the conflict persist, submit your concern for review by the Board of Directors, which includes a team of founding Noah Webster Academy teachers. They will work collaboratively to seek a resolution that aligns with Noah Webster Academy’s values and mission.

Steps To Discipline

Steps to Discipline

At Noah Webster Academy, we believe that discipline is a means of guiding students toward self-control, personal responsibility, and Christ-like character. The following steps outline the disciplinary process when student behavior does not align with the academy's expectations:

1. Verbal Warning & Correction

2. Student-Teacher Conference

Should the behavior persist, parents will be contacted to discuss the issue. A conference may be scheduled with the student, teacher, and possibly an administrator to develop a plan for improvement.

Attendance Policy

Consistent and timely attendance not only supports each student's educational progress but also contributes to a productive and engaging learning environment for the entire class. Absences and tardiness disrupt the classroom dynamic, interfere with collaborative learning, and create additional administrative responsibilities for teachers.

As part of our educational philosophy, we strive to minimize unnecessary administrative burdens on teachers, allowing them to dedicate their time and resources to meaningful instruction for all students.

We ask families to make attendance and punctuality a priority, recognizing their vital role in maintaining the integrity of our learning community.

Absence Policy

Excessive Absences

Students who accumulate **12 absences** within a school year risk falling behind academically and may be required to repeat their current grade. To ensure families are aware of attendance concerns, written notifications will be sent as needed.

Punctuality and Tardiness

Punctuality is essential to a quality education. All students are expected to arrive at school on time and be in their classrooms when instruction begins. Noah Webster Academy strictly enforces punctuality to uphold a structured and effective learning environment.

Tardies

- **Three tardies equal one absence.**
- Students are considered tardy if they arrive late to school.
- Upper grammar students may also be marked tardy if they arrive late to individual classes.

- Accumulating **three tardies within an academic quarter** will result in one recorded absence.

Consistently arriving late demonstrates a lack of self-governance and responsibility. Chronic tardiness will be addressed through a **mandatory meeting** involving the student, ensuring accountability and a commitment to improving punctuality.

Arrival and Departure Procedures

Late Arrivals

- Students arriving **after 8:00 a.m.** must check in at the front office with a parent or responsible adult to obtain an admission slip before entering class.
- Students who arrive **without a parent** will receive an **unexcused tardy**.

Arrival Guidelines

- Students may not arrive before **7:45 a.m.** Parents should plan travel time accordingly.
- For security purposes, **all students must enter and exit through the main doors.** All other doors are designated for emergency use only.

Early Checkouts

- Students leaving early must check out through the **front office**.
- Parents should **wait in the office** for their child rather than going directly to the classroom.

End-of-Day Pick-Up

- **Drive Line pick-up begins at 3:00 p.m.** Parents arriving early must avoid blocking traffic.
- **Students not picked up by 3:15 p.m.** will be enrolled in the after-school program, and parents will be charged accordingly.

Substitute Ride Policy

- If someone **other than a parent** will pick up a student, parents must submit **written permission** to the school office and classroom teacher.
- The note must include:

 - **Vehicle details**
 - **Contact information**

Homework Policy and Philosophy

At Noah Webster Academy, we view homework as an essential tool to reinforce classroom learning, develop independent study skills, and encourage the active involvement of families in the educational process. However, we also recognize the importance of balancing academic responsibilities with family activities and personal well-being.

Purpose and Philosophy

- Homework is designed to be meaningful and directly tied to classroom instruction, providing students with opportunities to practice and master key concepts.
- At Noah Webster Academy, we are committed to assigning homework that is intentional and purposeful. Each assignment is carefully designed to reinforce learning, enhance understanding, and contribute meaningfully to the student's academic growth. We do not assign homework simply for the sake of keeping students busy.
- Our general philosophy is that students' time at home should be primarily for family activities. However, we acknowledge that some homework is necessary to reinforce learning and foster academic success.

Student Expectations

- Students are expected to work diligently during the school day and take full advantage of time provided for completing assignments.
- Homework should be completed to the best of the student's ability and submitted on time. Homework is due at the start of class. Late work will not be accepted.
- Upper grammar students are responsible for managing their assignments, seeking clarification when needed, and planning effectively to meet deadlines.

Family Role

- Each student's education is an important family matter, and consistent reinforcement at home of lessons and principles learned at school is a vital component of academic success.
- Parents are encouraged to support their children, as necessary and appropriate, in completing all homework assignments on time and to the best of their capability.
- Families should foster an environment conducive to learning by providing a quiet,

organized space and offering guidance when needed, without completing assignments on behalf of the student.

Teacher Responsibility

- Teachers are committed to assigning homework that is reasonable in scope, relevant to classroom instruction, and appropriate for the student's grade level and abilities.
- Homework instructions and deadlines will be clearly communicated to ensure that students and families understand the purpose and expectations of each assignment.
- Teachers will also consider the overall workload of students to avoid overburdening them with excessive assignments.
- Teachers will provide clear, consistent, and weekly communication to students and parents regarding homework assignments and expectations. However, it remains the primary responsibility of students and parents to proactively seek clarification or additional information if any assignment details are unclear.

Friday Assignments

Noah Webster Academy recognizes the importance of maintaining a strong learning process even on days without formal instruction. Fridays are intended as a flexible day and a remote learning day for students and parents to work together, reinforcing and extending the week's learning.

- **Purpose of Friday Assignments:**

While formal classes are not held on Fridays, students may be assigned additional work, such as projects, reports, or other larger assignments, to support their academic progress. Families should plan and budget time on Fridays to complete these assignments.

- **Family Collaboration:**

Fridays provide an excellent opportunity for parents to actively engage in their child's education, supporting and guiding them as needed. This collaboration helps ensure that the student remains on track academically.

- **Efficient Scheduling:**

Whenever possible, parents are encouraged to schedule lessons, appointments, or other activities on **Fridays**, leaving the remainder of the school week available for academic focus and uninterrupted learning.

By making Fridays a productive and intentional day for reinforcement and enrichment, Noah Webster Academy fosters a partnership between school and home that strengthens the student's overall educational experience.

At Noah Webster Academy, we aim to cultivate a culture of hard work during the school day while maintaining a strong emphasis on family time at home. By working together, students, families, and teachers can ensure that homework serves as a meaningful extension of learning without disrupting the balance of life outside the classroom.

Process for Handling Incomplete Assignments

When a student fails to complete an assignment, the following steps will be taken:

1. The student will be referred to the office for accountability.
2. While in the office, the student must contact a parent or guardian to inform them of the missing work.
3. The student will remain in the office until the assignment is finished.
4. Once the assignment is complete, a designated staff member will review the work before allowing the student to return to class.

Grading Policy

Both parents and teachers play a critical role in shaping how students understand and value their grades. By maintaining a unified approach at home and at school, we can ensure that grades remain a source of motivation, encouragement, and accountability in a student's educational journey.

- **Requires little to no reminders for behavior or rule adherence.**
- **Serves as a positive role model and leader among peers.**
- **Demonstrates a sincere desire to honor God in daily conduct.**

Satisfactory (S) - Developing Self-Governance

- **Generally responsible and respectful but may need occasional reminders.**
- **Completes most assignments on time with minimal prompting.**

- Additional disciplinary actions, including suspension, may be taken based on the severity of the offense.

Honor Roll

- Students who achieve **straight A's in all their classes** qualify for the prestigious “A” **Honor Roll**.

Recognition:

- Students who earn a place on the “A” Honor Roll will be invited to an **awards ceremony at the end of each quarter** to celebrate their outstanding achievements.

By honoring our high achievers, we aim to reinforce the values of excellence, perseverance, and the joy of learning, ensuring that every student at Noah Webster Academy feels inspired to reach their full potential.

Standardized Testing Policy

At Noah Webster Academy, we believe that education should focus on meaningful learning, critical thinking, and the development of well-rounded individuals. We do not subscribe to the notion that frequent standardized testing improves student education or enhances the learning environment. Instead, we aim to foster a culture where true understanding and mastery are prioritized over test performance.

Our Philosophy on Testing:

- Noah Webster Academy does not teach to the test. Unlike many public and private schools, we do not structure our curriculum around standardized testing.
- We categorically reject the principles underlying Common Core and remain committed to an approach that values individualized learning and academic excellence.

Annual Testing:

- Students in grades K–8 participate in **Iowa Assessments** testing once per year. This is a nationally recognized assessment tool that provides a snapshot of student achievement and measures academic progress compared to peers across the country.
- These tests are not used as a basis for extensive preparation or classroom instruction. They are solely an academic measure to assess progress and identify areas for growth.

No Test-Driven Preparation:

- Noah Webster Academy does not engage in a course of preparation for standardized tests. Instead, we focus on delivering a rigorous and engaging curriculum that naturally equips

students with the skills and knowledge needed to succeed in assessments and beyond.

By limiting standardized testing to once annually and emphasizing its role as a simple academic benchmark, we ensure that our students' time is spent on meaningful learning experiences rather than excessive test preparation. This approach supports a healthier and more productive educational environment for both students and teacher.

Student Work Study Program

At Noah Webster Academy, the *Student Work Study Program* is a cornerstone of our commitment to preparing students for future stations in life. This unique initiative ensures that every student, from kindergarten through eighth grade, actively participates in the operation and care of the school. By engaging in meaningful roles, students develop real-world job experience, cultivate a strong work ethic, and learn essential life skills that will benefit them throughout their lives.

How It Works

- **Assigned Roles:** Every student is assigned a support role in various areas of the school. These roles may include:

- **Games:** Kickball, dodgeball, four square, badminton, croquet, and relay races
- **Other Activities:** Tug-of-war, capture the flag, obstacle courses, yoga, and mindfulness exercises

These teacher-led activities not only reinforce physical fitness but also build teamwork, coordination, and discipline while helping students manage energy and focus throughout the day.

School Safety & Emergency Response Plan

At Noah Webster Academy, the safety and well-being of our students, faculty, and staff are our highest priority. This School Safety & Emergency Response Plan provides clear procedures for responding to various emergencies, ensuring preparedness and swift action when needed.

General Safety Principles

1. **Preparedness** – Staff and students will receive regular training on emergency procedures.
 2. **Communication** – Emergency notifications will be sent through the school's designated alert system.
 3. **Accountability** – Teachers are responsible for knowing the whereabouts of their students at all times.
 4. **Calm Response** – In every situation, staff will lead by example, demonstrating confidence and order.
 5. **Prayer & Assurance** – In moments of crisis, our community is encouraged to seek peace and strength through faith.

Fire Drill Procedures

Purpose: To ensure a safe, orderly evacuation in case of fire or smoke.

Fire Drill Steps:

1. **Alarm Activation:** A continuous alarm will sound. Teachers must immediately instruct students to line up and remain silent.
2. Evacuation:
 - Walk calmly to the designated evacuation area (posted in each classroom).
 - The last person exiting the room should close the door without locking it.
3. **Attendance Check:** Teachers will take roll once outside. Any missing students must be reported immediately.
4. **Wait for Clearance:** The administration and emergency personnel will assess the situation.
5. **Re-Entry:** Once deemed safe, students will be escorted back inside in an orderly fashion.

Fire Drills will be conducted monthly to ensure readiness.

Lockdown Procedures

Lockdowns are used to protect students and staff from immediate threats inside or near the school.

Soft Lockdown (Precautionary Safety Measures – No Immediate Threat Inside)

Used for: Nearby police activity, suspicious persons in the area, or other potential risks.

1. **Announcement:** "Soft lockdown in effect. Please secure all areas."
2. **Lock Doors:** Teachers lock classroom doors but continue instruction.
3. **Limit Movement:** Students stay inside, and hallway movement is restricted.

4. **Monitor Updates:** Staff will await further instructions via the school communication system.
 5. **All Clear:** Once law enforcement or administration deems it safe, an "All Clear" announcement will be made.

Hard Lockdown (Active Threat Inside or Direct Danger to the School)

Used for: Intruder, active shooter, or immediate violent threat

1. **Announcement:** "Hard lockdown. Lock doors. Stay silent. Stay hidden."
2. **Lock & Barricade:**
 - All doors are locked, lights turned off, and windows covered.
 - If possible, furniture should be used to barricade entry points.
3. **Silence & Concealment:**
 - Students and staff should stay silent and out of sight.
 - Phones should be on silent (not vibrate).
4. **Emergency Communication:**
 - 911 should be called if safe to do so.
 - The administration will communicate with law enforcement.
5. **Stay in Place:**
 - Do not open doors for anyone unless a recognized law enforcement officer gives the all-clear.
6. **Evacuation (If Necessary):**
 - If an opportunity to escape safely presents itself, students and staff should evacuate and run to safety.

Hard Lockdown drills will be conducted semi-annually.

Emergency Communication & Parent Notification

- In an emergency, parents will receive alerts via email, text, and phone calls.
 - Parents are advised NOT to come to the school unless instructed to do so, as this can interfere with emergency response efforts.
 - Updates will be provided as the situation develops, with reunification procedures communicated when necessary.

Reunification Procedures (Emergency Dismissal)

In the event of a major emergency requiring student pickup, a reunification site will be established. Parents will be notified via official school communication channels with instructions on where and how to retrieve their children safely.

Parent Pickup Steps:

1. Parents must present identification.
 2. Students will be released only to authorized guardians.
 3. A sign-out log will be maintained for accountability.

Training & Review

- All staff will receive annual emergency response training.
 - Students will participate in age-appropriate safety drills throughout the school year.
 - The School Safety Committee will regularly review and update procedures as needed.

No Cell Phone & Electronic Device Policy

Policy Overview

To foster a focused, respectful, and spiritually enriching learning environment, students at Noah Webster Academy are not permitted to bring cell phones or other personal electronic devices (including smartwatches, tablets, or personal laptops) onto campus at any time. This policy is in effect from the moment students arrive until they leave school grounds, including before and after school activities, lunch, recess, and passing periods.

Rationale for the Policy

At Noah Webster Academy, we believe that removing personal electronic devices from the school environment enhances learning, promotes meaningful relationships, and nurtures spiritual growth. This policy is in place for the following reasons:

1. **Academic Excellence** – Personal devices create distractions and hinder student engagement. Eliminating them ensures students remain focused on their studies and actively participate in class discussions.
2. **Social & Emotional Development** – By removing the reliance on digital communication, students build stronger in-person connections, develop better social skills, and engage in Christ-centered interactions.
3. **Spiritual Awareness** – A technology-free environment encourages students to be present, practice self-discipline, and seek God’s guidance throughout the school day.
4. **Integrity & Safety** – Prohibiting personal devices on campus helps prevent cyberbullying, cheating, exposure to inappropriate content, and social media distractions, ensuring a safe and morally upright school culture.
5. **Respect & Self-Governance** – Learning to function without personal electronics teaches students patience, discipline, and responsibility – essential qualities for Christian character development.

Expectations & Enforcement

- Students are not allowed to bring cell phones or other electronic devices onto school property.
- Any necessary communication between parents and students must go through the front office.
- Students needing access to a phone for emergency purposes may request permission from school staff.
- Parents should ensure that students leave all devices at home before arriving at school.

Consequences for Violations

If a student is found with a cell phone or electronic device on campus:

1. **First Offense:** Device is confiscated and held in the school office; a parent/guardian must retrieve it at the end of the school day.
2. **Second Offense:** Device is confiscated, and the student will receive a disciplinary consequence; parents will be required to meet with administration.
3. **Third Offense:** Additional disciplinary action, which may include detention, suspension, or further consequences as determined by administration.

Exceptions & Special Circumstances

- Students with documented medical needs requiring an electronic device for health purposes may receive administrative approval.
- Teachers may permit the use of school-provided technology for academic purposes only, under strict supervision.

Child Abuse and Neglect Policy

Commitment to Student Safety

At Noah Webster Academy, we believe that every child is a precious gift from God, deserving of love, protection, and care. As a Christ-centered institution, we are committed to providing a safe, nurturing environment where students can grow spiritually, academically, and emotionally. In alignment with biblical principles and legal requirements, we take all concerns of child abuse and neglect seriously and adhere to strict policies for prevention, reporting, and response.

I. Definition of Child Abuse and Neglect

Noah Webster Academy follows state and federal definitions of child abuse and neglect, which include:

1. **Physical Abuse** – Any non-accidental injury or excessive discipline that causes physical harm to a child.
2. **Sexual Abuse** – Any form of sexual exploitation, harassment, inappropriate contact, or exposure to sexually explicit content.
3. **Emotional Abuse** – Actions that cause significant emotional harm, including verbal threats, intimidation, humiliation, or excessive criticism.
4. **Neglect** – Failure to provide a child with basic needs such as food, shelter, supervision, medical care, or education.

II. Prevention Measures

To maintain a safe and Christ-honoring environment, **Noah Webster Academy implements the following prevention strategies:**

- **Staff & Volunteer Screening** – All employees, faculty, and volunteers who interact with students must undergo a thorough background check, including fingerprinting and reference verification.

IV. School Response to Allegations Involving Staff or Volunteers

If an accusation of abuse or neglect is made against a **school employee, faculty member, or volunteer**, the following steps will be taken:

1. **Immediate Removal:** The accused individual will be placed on administrative leave while an investigation is conducted.
2. **Investigation:** Law enforcement and child protective services will be notified, and the school will cooperate fully with their investigation.
3. **Protection of Students:** The school will take **immediate measures** to ensure student safety, which may include temporary changes in classroom supervision or staffing.
4. **Communication with Parents:** If appropriate, parents will be informed of the situation in a **transparent yet sensitive manner**, ensuring that **student privacy** is respected.
5. **Final Determination:** If allegations are substantiated, the staff member or volunteer will be **permanently removed** from their position, and further legal action may be pursued.

V. Student Support & Counseling
