The content structure of the abstract includes several main components, namely background, objective, method, findings and implications, and conclusion. Background: provides a brief overview of the issue or problem underlying the research and its relevance to the field of study. Objective: is briefly stated to indicate the direction and focus of the research conducted. Method: describes the approach, design, and techniques of data collection and analysis used in the study. Findings and Implications: present the main results of the research along with their impact or contribution to the development of knowledge, practice, or policy. Conclusion: contains the final statement that answers the research objective and, if necessary, provides recommendations or directions for future research.

Subsequent paragraphs should have a first-line indentation of 1.00 cm. The introduction contains the background of the problem globally, specific issues, literature facts, previous research and research gap, theories or approaches to be used for analysis, as well as the objectives and benefits of the research conducted.
