USGA Child Protection SOP

(Effective May 16, 2025)

The USGA is committed to the protection and safeguarding of all children in its care. The USGA strives to handle every case of suspected abuse or behavior diligently and with utmost care. Immediate action, thorough investigation, and transparent communication are paramount to ensuring that every child is protected.

This SOP applies to the USGA employees, administrators, and volunteers who are assigned to assist with any USGA event/program (collectively known as "workers").

1. Immediate Actions

Any workers who observe or become aware of any suspected abuse or behavior that may put any child(ren) in its care at risk (each, an "Observer") should immediately report to the USGA-assigned minister(s) and event/program coordinator(s) such suspected abuse or behavior and also take any immediate action necessary to stop ongoing harm as set forth below.

Key steps:

- **Ensure the child(ren)'s safety**: First, the Observer(s) to remove the child(ren) from any immediate danger and place them in a secure, safe environment. This action is focused on protecting the child(ren)'s well-being in urgent situations.
- **Provide medical care**: The Observer(s) to arrange for immediate medical treatment if necessary.
- **Report to relevant personnel**: The Observer(s) to ensure that the USGA-assigned minister(s) <u>and</u> event/program coordinator(s) are informed of the suspected abuse or behavior as soon as possible.
- **Document the incident**: All event/program coordinator(s) to start documenting the details of steps taken.
- **Contact authorities**: The Observer(s) who are mandated reporters to follow mandated reporting laws and notify applicable authorities to the extent required by law.

2. Separation of Parties

To protect both the child(ren) and the integrity of the investigation, the alleged offender(s) to be removed from any environment where they could have further contact with the child(ren).

Key steps:

- **Separate the alleged offender(s) and child(ren)**: Event/program coordinator(s) to remove the alleged offender(s) from any role, setting, or activity where they may have contact with the child(ren) during the investigation. This is aimed at preventing further potential harm or interference.
- Maintain confidentiality: All involved to protect the identities of the child(ren) and alleged offender(s).
- **Support all involved parties**: The USGA-assigned minister(s) and event/program coordinator(s) to ensure the child(ren) and alleged offender(s) are free from any blaming or undue pressure, and provide necessary emotional support.

3. Reporting to Overseeing Entity

The incident should be reported to the overseeing USGA department or region.

Key steps:

- **Notify overseers**: The USGA-assigned minister(s) and event/program coordinator(s) to inform the overseeing USGA department or region about the situation and actions taken.
- **Provide relevant documents**: The USGA-assigned minister(s) and event/program coordinator(s) to share reports, timelines, and documentation related to the suspected abuse or behavior.
- **Ensure compliance**: The USGA-assigned minister(s) and event/program coordinator(s) to follow mandated reporting laws and submit necessary information to authorities, if required by law.

4. Investigation

An investigation should be initiated upon receiving the report.

Key steps:

- **Assign investigators**: Overseeing USGA department or region to assign investigating personnel.
- **Gather evidence**: The investigating personnel to collect initial witness statements, written reports, and physical evidence.
- **Interview parties**: The investigating personnel to conduct interviews with the child(ren), the alleged offender(s), and witnesses with appropriate safeguards in place. (In some states, interviews should be conducted by trained and vetted individuals.)
- **Maintain confidentiality**: The investigating personnel to ensure the investigation is discreet and all records are kept confidential to protect all parties' privacy.

5. Debriefing and Communication

Once the investigation concludes, all involved parties should be informed of the findings and decisions while maintaining appropriate confidentiality.

Key steps:

- **Inform all involved parties**: The USGA-assigned minister(s) and event/program coordinator(s) to communicate the outcome to the child(ren)'s parents/guardians (on behalf of the child(ren)) and the alleged offender(s).
- **Provide support**: The USGA-assigned minister(s) and event/program coordinator(s) to offer spiritual and emotional support, through the church, to the child(ren) and family throughout the process.
- **Explain next steps**: If further action is needed, the USGA-assigned minister(s), event/program coordinator(s) or the investigating personnel, as appropriate, to inform relevant parties about what to expect moving forward.
- **Document outcomes**: The investigating personnel to prepare a final report that summarizes the investigation and decisions and share the final report with the overseeing USGA department or region.
