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Introduction, Course Goals and Objectives

This course explores the scope and methods of political science. We will consider the ways in which social scientists study politics, address the history and nature of political science as a discipline, examine qualitative and quantitative research methods used by political scientists, and look at a variety of important conceptual tools that political scientists use to make sense of politics. The goal is to help students understand the connections among the epistemological, theoretical, methodological, and practical elements of political science. The course is also meant to enable you to design and carry out your own empirical studies, critically interpret and assess the work of other political scientists, and understand the world we live in.

Course Requirements and Evaluation

Students are expected to come to class, keep up with the readings, and participate in discussions. Coming to class prepared, asking questions, and listening to others will benefit you and help make the classroom environment enjoyable and rewarding. While class discussion about the complex topics we will discuss is encouraged, it does not give anyone the right to make intolerant or disparaging remarks regarding race, gender, sexual orientation or political ideologies. Please remember that any topic can be addressed, as long as it is done in a respectful and civil manner. That said, our classroom will be a forum for open debate and I will guarantee full freedom of expression.

It is also highly recommended that students read the newspaper and keep up with current world events, for this will enrich our discussions. Please feel free to bring newspaper clippings to class and bring up relevant topics related to the issues we are studying.
