Liturgical Year:

Things you should know:

- What is the Liturgical year?
 - The definition in your book glossary is a good one!
 - In the back of your book, you have a Liturgical calendar you can look at as you review, too. (5th grade p. 216)
- What season begins the liturgical year?
- What are the other seasons in our liturgical year?
- What is the purpose/meaning/focus of each season in our liturgical year?
- How long is each season? Do you know when each season starts and ends?
- What color vestment does the priest wear for each season?
 - What does each color represent?
 - Purple: penance, repentance
 - Green: growth, hope, life
 - White: joy, glory innocence
 - Red: can be for the Holy Spirit (e.g., on Pentecost) or for bloodshed (Jesus'
 - Good Friday, Palm Sunday, or on the feast day of a martyr
- Some feasts to know: Epiphany, Ascension, Pentecost: When does each feast occur?
 What do we celebrate/recall?

You need to know the three categories of sacraments and which sacraments fall into each category:

For each of the seven sacraments, you should know:

- What is the definition/purpose of the sacrament? (Know well enough to recognize in a matching/multiple choice/true-false sort of format although it would be fabulous if you truly knew the definitions. (2)
- Who is the <u>ordinary minister</u> of each sacrament? Know which sacraments can be performed by ministers at each degree of Holy Orders (deacon, priest, bishop).
 - Remember, there is one sacrament where the ministers of the sacrament are NOT an ordained minister! (The priest is considered to be a witness for this sacrament.) Which sacrament is this?
- What are the important steps included in the rite of the sacrament? Some liturgical actions occur
 in more than one sacrament! Focus on the things that are most central/important to the
 sacrament. Read the list below and think about which sacraments these occur in:
 - Reciting of Baptism promises
 - Being anointed with holy oil
 - There are three kinds of holy oils: the oil of catechumens, the oil of the sick, and sacred Chrism. In one sacrament, more than one holy oil is used.
 - Pouring of holy water
 - Laying on of hands
 - Reciting of vows
- How many times can you receive each sacrament? Which can be received many times? Which can only be received once?
- You should be familiar with the **sacramentals** associated with the various sacraments. Think about which sacrament the various items below apply to:
 - Candles (baptismal candle, Paschal candle), rings, vestments, white garment, holy water, holy oil...
- Here are some vocabulary words associated with the sacraments that you should know:
 - Grace
 - Sanctifying grace
 - Sin (original sin, venial sin, mortal sin)
 - absolution

- You should know the <u>parts of the Mass</u> as we learned about them in our Eucharist chapter. You should know and understand what happens during each part of the Mass.
 - o Introductory Rites
 - Liturgy of the Word
 - Liturgy of the Eucharist
 - Concluding Rites
- You need to know and understand our beliefs about the Eucharist. (See link below!)

I put more saints here than will show up on the exam... but if I left a name off the list, they won't be on the test. (Mary has a LOT of feast days... focus on the other saints below for studying dates and don't worry about feast days for St. John's or Mary's parents either!)

I can't give away any specific questions on the test, but I will say that the 5th grade test is tougher than the 6th grade tests where saints are concerned, so spend a little time rereading their stories and making sure you know who's who. If I have time, I'll look on YouTube and see if there are any good links of videos to watch about these saints - Sometimes seeing their story can help you to remember!

Some things that might be helpful to read over on the curriculum:

- Information on the saints! There's a paragraph or two about each saint included in the curriculum guidelines. You won't be asked anything about a saint that isn't stated explicitly in the curriculum!
- Bullet point lists about each Sacrament: Make sure it all seems familiar to you!
