Both the title and the abstract must be written in English, formatted as a single paragraph with single line spacing, using Times New Roman font size 10, and should not exceed 200 words.

INTRODUCTION (BOLD, TNR 12)

This section presents the background of the problem, including its context, a detailed examination, and an analysis of the gap between ideal conditions and actual circumstances. It should be supported by relevant theories, up-to-date research, and clearly state the study's objectives. The issue addressed must contribute new value or offer innovative insights to the field. Use Times New Roman font size 12.

METHOD (BOLD, TNR 12)

This section should be written briefly, clearly, and precisely to allow replication. It outlines the research approach, study participants, research procedures, materials and instruments used, data collection methods, and analysis techniques.

RESULT AND DISCUSSION (BOLD, TNR 12)

To enhance readability and understanding, the findings should be presented first, followed by the discussion. This section must offer a clear and concise summary of the research results, along with their interpretation and the conclusions that can be drawn. The Findings and Discussion should be organized under separate subheadings.

Result (Bold, TNR 12)

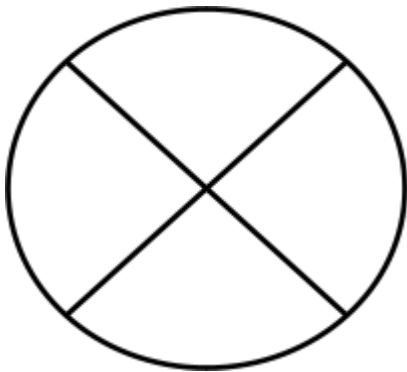


Figure 1. Please adjust according to your needs

Data analysis results may be presented using tables, graphs, figures, or a combination of these formats. However, they should not be excessively long, large, or numerous. Authors are encouraged to use a balanced variety of tables, graphs, and descriptive text for clarity. Every table and graph must be referenced within the main text. The standard table format is illustrated in Table 1, where vertical lines are omitted, and horizontal lines are used only at the top and bottom. Font size within tables may be

reduced if needed. Information shown in figures or tables should not be redundantly repeated in the surrounding narrative. All tables and figures must be properly cited in the text, for example, as Figure 1 or Table 1.

The conclusion should go beyond merely restating the findings. It must provide a meaningful synthesis, highlighting the significance of the results. This section should connect what was anticipated in the *Introduction* with what was actually observed in the *Findings and Discussion*, ensuring coherence between expectations and outcomes. Additionally, it may include suggestions for expanding upon the research findings and exploring opportunities for future studies.
