Principles of Judging Debate

This 17 minute video explores the 5 main principles of judging competitive debate: Be an educator, Independent decisions, Non-intervention, Multiple decision-makers, and Identifying who occupies the most space in the debate. The first 4 are applicable to judging any competitive speech & debate event. (Although independence is not practiced in the British Parliamentary debate format.) The last principle is specific to debate. (Applies to policy debate, Lincoln Douglas debate, public forum, NPDA. Much of the presentation applies to any forensics/speech & debate activity.)

Judging Extemporaneous Commentary

What is EXTEMPORANEOUS COMMENTARY? What does EXTEMPORANEOUS COMMENTARY mean?

Extemporaneous commentary (or extemp com for short) is a branch of normal extemporaneous speaking, an area of competition in high school forensics. Students participating in extemporaneous commentary are given 20 minutes to prepare a five-minute speech (with a 30-second grace period) on a topic relevant to modern politics. Students in commentary deliver their speeches sitting down, usually on the opposite side of a table from the judge(s). Students are score based on oration skills, speech organization, and use of sources and are ranked by the judges in comparison to the other competitors who give speeches in the same room.
