<b>Content</b>	The Constitutional Review course deals with the study of all forms and techniques of interpretation of constitutional norms. Constitutional review systems, the jurisdiction of constitutional courts, jurisprudential policies and a range of other important issues will be addressed in this case. Decisions of the constitutional courts of European and other countries, the constitutional court of the Republic of Kosovo and the European Court of Human Rights, are also the subject of this case.
<b>Purpose</b>	This course aims to acquaint undergraduate students with the theoretical and practical part of the Constitutional Judiciary as a separate branch of law. In particular, students will analyze the basic concepts of the constitutional judiciary, systems and institutions of the constitutional judiciary. Special attention will be paid to the constitutional court of the Republic of Kosovo.

There will be no tolerance for copying, "borrowing" from the Internet or any other material. The same or similar works will have negative evaluations in the final evaluation of the student.</li> </ul> <p><b>Deadlines</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• In agreement with the students, the deadlines for submitting works will be determined. There will be no tolerance for delays in the submission of works. Failure to arrive at the time when the assignment is explained does not justify the student for not submitting the paper. The deadline will be given earlier. If you are going to travel abroad, then you need to submit the paperwork in advance.
