


Kindergarten and First Grade Inclusion



Girls in Action: Stepping Into Your Power



2025 Junior / Senior Prom



Social Emotional Updates

I am pleased to share SEL Grants that Randolph Public Schools (RPS) has been awarded

1) In Partnership with the Center for Trauma Care in Schools at the Alliance for Inclusion and Prevention (AIP) This partnership will provide us with three years of training and intervention to K-5 schools in trauma-informed SEL "Kernels" (brief activities to reinforce SEL skills across all MTSS tiers). These TI-SEL Kernels are implemented in classrooms, groups, and individual counseling while simultaneously supporting a trauma-informed school climate initiative developed for the National Center for Safe and Supportive Learning Environments (NCSSLE). (Shout Out to Kim Duane).

2) Aspire Health Alliance organization provides a wide array of counseling and evaluation services to children and their families - highly specialized services such as early intervention, outreach and in-home therapy in settings such as homes, hospitals, clinics, community-based centers and schools. This summer they will provide tele-health services to students at the Donovan School and continue for the 25-26 school year as well as provide a Clinician/Crisis Responder who will support the JFK and Young Schools and RCMS and RHS for the 25-26 school year.


