Abstract: the abstract submitted to Thaqafiyyat should be concise and factual containing the statement of topic, objectives, arguments, and general findings. References are not necessarily needed. The use of abbreviation should be avoided; provided that it is necessary, it should be defined in the initial part of the abstract, e.g. Universitas Islam Negeri (UIN). In addition, the abstract should not contain picture(s) or table(s), yet using single space, **Palatino Linotype**, font size 11, and comprise of 150-250 words.

Keywords: Keywords should contain the general terms, and be single-spaced, **Palatino Linotype font**, font size 11, no more than 5 phrases each separated by a semicolon [;], e.g., Excellent society; western; Muslims; etc.

INTRODUCTION [Palatino Linotype, bold, 12pt]

The manuscript is written using *Palatino Linotype*, size 2 and 1 line spacing. Do not add space before and/or after the paragraphs. Footnote sample¹ Footnote sample² Footnote sample³ (*The Turabian 8th Style (full note)*

The introduction should include the following components: background, literature review, conceptual framework (if necessary), objectives and goals, and research approach.

[Background] This segment should present a clear and logical argument for the significance or relevance of the study, with evidence from the literature and fact to support the idea.

[Gap and Novelty] Identify gaps to be addressed in the study, and establish *the study's contribution (novelty)* to the field.

[Conceptual or theoretical framework] If necessary, describe the theoretical basis for the research and how the theories are interconnected in a conceptual framework, referencing relevant literature.

[Objectives and aims] Conclude the introduction with a clear and concise summary of the study's aims and objectives, and consider briefly discussing the significance and/or limitations of the research.

[Methods] This section describes how the research was conducted, research design, data collection techniques, instrument development, and data analysis techniques. This section explains how the data was collected/generated and an explanation of how the data was analyzed.

BODY ARTICLE

The body article should at least consist of the *Result* and *Discussion, and must be into subheadings*.

Result

The author should explain the research results (what was discovered) in detail. Results can be presented with tables or graphs, to clarify the results.

Discussion

Discussion is the most important part of the entire content of scientific articles. The objectives of the discussion are: to answer research problems, interpret findings, integrate findings from research into existing sets of knowledge and/or compose new theories or modify existing theories. The discussion should be able to resolve or provide explanations for the question stated in the introduction.

CONCLUSION

Contains conclusions and suggestions. Conclusions include answers to research questions. The conclusion does not contain the repetition of the results and discussion, but rather the summary of the findings as expected in the objectives or hypotheses. Suggestion presents the things that will be done related to the next idea of the research. Written in essay form, not numerical form. If any, recommendations can be put in this section.

If any, thanks are addressed to official institutions or individuals who have provided funding or have made other contributions to the research. Acknowledgments are accompanied by a research contract number.
