
Formative Practice: Includes classroom work, and may include some homework assignments. Practice that focuses on one or more of the other GRCs and prepares students for the other GRCs

Content:

Level 1: Identifying content, vocabulary, basic ideas. Example: Define liberal and conservative and place them on a political spectrum

Level 2: Applying, connecting and extending the content/using the content for higher level activities. Example: Read an editorial article, identify the point of view and place it on a spectrum. Evaluate the point of view.

Communication: Written and Oral communication. Writing skills such as thesis, organization, structure, providing evidence and analysis for your points. Grammar, usage and mechanics. Oral communication may include presentations, seminars, debates, discussions, rhetorical devices, video production, etc.





Research and Source Analysis: Skills include analyzing the validity and point of view/bias, and strengths and weaknesses of various sources, especially electronic sources. Includes finding and evaluating information, taking notes from multiple sources, quoting/paraphrasing that information and citing it properly, both in-text citations and on Work Cited pages.


General Expectations

- Grades are based upon the demonstration of proficiency on units associated with a standard given during each formative or summative assessment. Formative grades in addition to summative unit assessments will be used to holistically determine your grade.
- Summative: Summative measures of achievement are taken when unit master is expected. (i.e., unit tests, culmination of a project, embedded assessments, etc.)
- Formative: Formative assessments measure the scaffolding skills and/or content embedded in the unit. Formative assessments are taken frequently, after a student has practiced a skill or become familiar with content. Examples of formative assessments include but are not limited to exit tickets, paragraphs, oral check for understanding, warm-ups, stages in a large project, etc.
- Assessments will be graded based on teacher/district/state rubrics.
- On group projects, students will receive a grade for individual work. A group grade may also be given.
- Grades are based on achievement of Colorado Academic Standards and grade level expectations.



	Student Expectations	
Grading Policy	The purpose of grading is to communicate to both students and parents what a student knows and can demonstrate at a given point during the course. In this course, student grades will be based solely on achievement of standards, not effort, behavior, or attitude.	
Testing Policy	Any missed tests must be made up as soon as possible.	
Assignments	Students will be informed as to the due dates for assignments, whether it is homework, a quiz/test, or a project. The required papers must be submitted to turnitin.com.	
Late work Policy	Students who have an excused absence will be allowed as many days as they were absent to make up work.	
Absence Policy	Students are expected to make up any work missed because of any absence. Students are responsible to request the make-up assignment(s). Students will have the number of days absent plus one additional day to make up missed work for an absence. Long-term illnesses will be dealt with on an individual basis.	
Tardy Policy	Students are expected to be on time to every class, every day. Beginning each semester, if tardy: 1st-3 rd : Verbal warning by teacher and parent contact on 3 rd . 5th: Teacher will speak with parent/guardian. 7th: 30 minute after school detention served with the teacher in the classroom. Teacher will speak to the parent/guardian again. After the 8 th tardy, teacher discretion may be used for consequences. Once a student has served three 30-minute detentions with the teacher, a student may be referred to the Deans' Office for defiance of authority.
