This is an open letter to the President, Provost, and Dean of Arts, calling for action to keep the University of Alberta's Department of East Asian Studies (EASIA) as an independent department in the face of the Faculty of Arts Academic Restructuring Initiative.

Firstly, we acknowledge all the graduated, current, and prospective students of EASIA who chose this department among more than two hundred undergraduate programs and over five hundred graduate programs. Having made illustrious advancements independently since 1981, we believe that if EASIA were to merge with another department, the students it represents would lose a sense of identity and representation.

We understand that the University of Alberta is suffering major budget cuts, and an academic restructuring is the last option to save millions of dollars. At the same time, our position to keep EASIA independent is in line with the University of Alberta's commitment to Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion.

The department's independence is closely related to the identity of thousands of East Asian students on campus. With the departure of EASIA comes the departure of KGK: East Asian Studies Undergraduate Students Association (KGK). This department association represents not just the students taking classes in East Asian Studies, but also all the students from East Asian countries. Last year, over 3300 international students from East Asia enrolled at the University of Alberta. The KGK creates a safe and welcoming environment for students who may feel alone and unsure. They can receive guidance and support from domestic students hailing from all disciplines. Through various cultural events throughout the year that attract hundreds of people, conversation clubs, and more, the KGK has promoted cross-cultural exchange unlike any other association on campus. Collapsing EASIA with another department will also, by extension, collapse the KGK, leaving thousands of students without representation and a place they can express their cultural identity.

Furthermore, considering the sheer number of students studying the historically more powerful West, East Asian Studies will no doubt be eclipsed in a merger. By keeping this department alive, we are advocating for the study and celebration of cultures, especially those who represent a visible minority on campus. We would also like to note that many departments in the Faculty of Arts are significantly larger than EASIA. The Modern Languages and Cultural Studies Department (MLCS), for example, is roughly three times larger than EASIA. If EASIA were to merge with a larger department, our ATS and professors would be underrepresented and prone to being outvoted in department and council meetings. We believe in order to maintain autonomy over major program decisions and course offerings, it is imperative that EASIA remain an independent department.

With regards to its academic features in the university, EASIA has a variety of courses to offer, including the culture, history, and language of East Asia. Whereas a majority of courses in the Faculty of Arts focus almost exclusively on Western cultures like North America, Latin America, and Europe, EASIA has the benefit of focusing on East Asian culture, which we feel is not represented enough on campus. Our department promotes global education both as a program and as a virtue — a virtue we feel is only becoming more crucial with the need for cross-cultural understanding and the rise of multiculturalism within the workforce.

A merger with another department may also endanger funding opportunities from government-funded organizations like The China Institute, Prince Takamado Japan Centre for Teaching and Research, and the Consulate General of the Republic of Korea in Vancouver. After all, EASIA also acts as a figurehead for the University's East Asian populace and research, making it a prominent target for such funders and sponsors. Historically, when the Faculty of Arts put out a plan to merge EASIA with MLCS in 2019, the Korea Foundation and Consulate General of the Republic of Korea in Vancouver actively voiced their opposition to the idea. These organizations help fund scholarships, travel abroad programs, faculty positions, Graduate Teaching and Research Assistantships, and other aspects within EASIA. Students who would benefit from these supports, including those outside the Faculty of Arts, would no longer have those supports available to them. Also in 2019, EASIA and the China Institute provided financial support to 46 University of Alberta students who attended the Summer in Harbin China program.

Considering that only 30% of those students were from the Faculty of Arts, a merger would mean that many students, within or outside the department, would be victim to this loss of funding.

Listed below are universities that have East Asian Studies as a separate department; these universities understand that the courses offered by EASIA cannot be simplified into another department. It is imperative that, as a university with aspirations to achieve, we recognize this fact and stand by it.

We urge on behalf of all the students enrolled in EASIA and thousands more students from East Asian countries for an independent EASIA.
