<u>Talking to Fireflies, Shrinking the Moon: A Parent's Guide to Nature Activities</u>, by Edward Duensing.

Beyond Ecophobia: Reclaiming the Heart in Nature Education, by David Sobel While exploring the philosophy and practice of nature education, the writer brings in some excellent nature activities. He also includes some useful titles in his bibliography.

Snips and Snails and Walnut Whales: Nature Crafts for Children, by Phyllis Fiarotta

<u>Keepers of the Earth; Keepers of the Animals; Keepers of Life; Keepers of the Night,</u> by Caduto and Bruchac

These amazing books combine traditional Native American stories with nature-oriented activities and scientific information. Most of the themes are aimed at elementary ages, but aspects of the stories and activities are fine for preschoolers, and the background information is helpful for teachers and parents.

Hands-On Nature, by Lingelbach and Purcell

Fantastic resource for environmental education.

Teaching Kids to Love the Earth, by Lachecki et al

186 outdoor activities designed for children of all ages.

Kids Camp!; More Than Moccasins; Eco Art, by Laurie Carlson

This author's activity and craft books are well laid out, informative and full of fun.

Nature Crafts, by Joy Williams

Very imaginative and beautifully presented photographs of each step in these projects.

Nature's Art Box, by Laura Martin

This one contains great background information and lots of details on 65 projects.

Discovering Nature With Young Children, by Chalufour and Worth

There is also a trainer's guide for this book that can be purchased separately. Both are available through NAEYC.

Proud Moments, by Howard Rainier

Beautiful, modern and colorful photographs of Native American people and landscapes.

Children's Picture Books -- Informational:

A Log's Life, by Wendy Pfeffer

What an amazingly told story, following the life and death cycle of an oak tree. The illustrations are truly phenomenal.

Animals Born Alive and Well; Plants That Never Ever Bloom; How to Hide a Butterfly, all by Ruth Heller. These are remarkable books with engaging rhymes about completely fascinating aspects of nature.

The Spider Makes a Web, by Joan Lexau

The details are wonderfully explained, with well drawn illustrations.

<u>Under One Rock: Bugs, Slugs and Other Ughs</u>, by Anthony D. Fredericks

This is beautifully illustrated with great close-ups, and the text rhymes.

The Tiny Seed; The Very Hungry Caterpillar, by Eric Carle

Both books teach growth concepts (except for the amazing things the caterpillar eats!) well, with Carle's signature illustrations.

National Geographic Books for Young Explorers series

This set of books appears to be out of print, but used copies are readily available. The photographs of animals, plants and landscapes and accompanying information is very appropriate for young children.

Nature's Children series, by Grolier and Scholastic Books

This 21 book set is topnotch for presenting fascinating facts about animals.

Children's Picture Books -- Stories:

Play With Me, by Marie Hall Ets

This is a lovely story about what happens when a little girl wants to play with the wild animals in the forest.

Stellaluna, by Janelle Cannon

I recently discovered a board game about this book too. This book has fun with the idea of what would happen if a little bat wound up in a bird's nest.

The Snail's Spell, by Joanne Ryder

This book encourages the reader to imagine life as a snail in the garden. The illustrations are excellent!

Quick as a Cricket, by Audrey Wood

We especially love this book since our dog's name is Cricket, who leads the children down our nature trails. The book inspires children to move like various animals and the illustrations are awesome.

Rainbow Crow, by Nancy Van Laan

This is a beautifully told version of this Native American legend.

<u>Is Your Mama a Llama?</u>, by Deborah Guarino

What a delightful rhyming book with lovely animal illustrations and a satisfying ending

The Mitten, by Jan Brett.

This and many other Jan Brett titles highlight beautiful landscapes and animals. Watch out for hedgie!

Everybody Needs a Rock, by Byrd Baylor

Wonderful illustrations and fascinating poetry. This author has written other great books.

Thirteen Moons on Turtle's Back, by Bruchac and London

Beautiful Native American stories about the thirteen moons.

Love Flute; Star Boy, by Paul Goble

Here's another prolific writer/illustrator, specializing in Native American stories.

Quillworker, by Terri Cohlene

This is a beautiful version of the Quillworker tale, which explains the origin of the Big Dipper.

The Girl Who Loved Coyotes, by Nancy Wood

This book includes a fine collection of coyote stories from the southwest. The illustrations are beautifully detailed.

Anansi the Spider, by Gerald McDermott

This classic Ashanti tale includes vivid descriptions of Anansi's sons' adventures as they travel to rescue Anansi. It's a fun one for acting out.
