## **Background**

Critical Moments or Positions: One important skill for a chess player is to feel the moment in a game when you really have to think hard and make an important decision. How do sense such critical moments? Critical moments are not taken lightly and are usually dynamic or tense moments during a game. Critical moments can be found using chess engines or in hindsight analysis, but usually reflect a turning point, tactic or combination, that ultimately decides the trajectory of a game.
