Review: Collocations

- Collocations are groups of words that are usually used together.
- Here are some common collocations and some examples.

adverb + adjective: She was extremely excited.

adjective + noun: Regular exercise is recommended.

noun + noun: He experienced a rush of adrenaline.

noun + verb: The alarm went off.

verb + noun: I would never commit a crime.

verb + expression with a preposition: She broke down in tears.

verb + adverb: Sleep soundly, my love.
