What is the general state of the OpenGov and Gov 2.0 communities? Are they significantly different communities?

- Transparency advocates that are focused on accountability seem to identify more with the opengov community than the Gov 2.0 community. Transparency advocates that are focused on open data seem to identify more with Gov 2.0. Consequently, the Gov 2.0 crowd seems to be relatively more tech-savvy and the conversation is tech-centric.
- (Noel) After several long years, the state of OpenGov and Gov 2.0 is progressing, like it should, adaptively and surely. From Drupal based Government sites that make it easier for sharing of code, to external organizations like "Code for America" starting their first year of staffers, to International Data summits, CapitolCamps, GOScons, to grassroot Open Local Gov meetups, the momentum for Open Govenment is tenuous AND progressing.
- (Noel) Are they different? Yes. OpenGov and Gov 2.0 are two distinct communities that get blended together. For the purpose of this conversation, they work hand in hand to help each other accomplish the goals of each other.
- (David) This is an interesting question & a valid one, but I prefer for it to be asked
 alongside its corollary, "Who should their shared target audiences be?" To which I hope
 the answer is, "For starters, anyone who reads political blogs or has a social media
 account should also have a suite of web / software / app tools for engagement that look
 & feel like Facebook but are also free, libre, and open-source."

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Which voices need to join the opengov and Gov 2.0 communities and

how can we reach them?

- Elected officials and candidates.
- Local gov officials
- Everyday Americans
- (Noel) I'd like to breakdown Americans not on who they are but what they are...
 - Advocacy Americans: We need to build tools to further enhance the dialogue between Americans. Wither it is budgets, environmental, health care, legislative issues, these are questions that are perpetually debated and issues that need the most attention when it comes to developing tools.
 - Consumer Americans: As citizens, we are constantly consuming our tax dollars.
 Wither it is roads, water, licences, parks, taxis, etc, we need consumer facing apps that help us better engage with the government services that we are paying for
 - Rural Americans: Population density is great for data driven apps. When you remove density, you remove some of the coolest features in the "2.0 space" augmented reality, heat crime maps, etc
 - Young Americans: We need to start developing digital civics courses where the youth are able to take their passion for technology and merry it with open data.
- (David) Charitable foundations of all sizes & individual philanthropists
- Government program managers where Gov 2.0/Opengov can help solve mission problems (Steve)

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What outcomes do the Gov 2.0 and opengov communities need in 2011?

- Reaching broader audiences
- (Noel) Engendering APIs as the foundation of data transportability
- (Noel) Prove that openness and open source can equate interoperability.
- (Noel) Have states, particularly agencies, and municipal governments adopt G2 and OG as default practices.
- (Lucas) A Creative Commons directory of OG/G2 case studies and effective practices
- (David) Continue to make the CivicCommons wiki up-to-date, relevant, and comprehensive knowledge base of best practices
- (David & Phil) help spread the coverage of legislative data on sites like
 OpenGovernment.org to reach more states and scale to local municipal legislative bodies as well.
- (Phil) Broadening David's comment better coordinate and share best practices for both policy and technology implementation convene standards & best practices.
- (Lucas) Connect the people who are working on the trenches locally.
- (Steve) Clearly demonstrating mission performance and changes in behavior/ROI

What outcomes do the Gov 2.0 and opengov communities need <u>from in-person events</u>?

- Communal support and collective empowerment to solve specific issues.
- Continuity of outcomes between events
- (Lucas) Opportunity to highlight inter-organizational projects and efforts to build community infrastructure (+1 Noel)
- (Noel) Allow for things to develop in the course of business. Don't rush things. (+1-Steve)
- Establish real human relationships that build collaboration and trust

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What are effective emerging formats for in-person events that will help us achieve those outcomes?

- Lightning talks, where 10 speakers each give 5-minute presentations.
- Fishbowl dialogue, where a the audience can become panelists and vice versa
- (Noel) Long-form dialogue sessions. Particularly unconferences and developer hack-a-thons.
- Help an agency/program focused session with an agency/program grappling with an issue - concrete advice that will be executed on (Like manor.govfresh - gov20 makeover - Steve)

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What collaboration is possible (and desirable) across organizations in the OpenGov and Gov 2.0 communities?

- We need to do a better job building community infrastructure (i.e. knowledge resources that everyone could use, but no one has the time to build alone)
- (Noel) Collective development of software platforms like "Open Public" and "Think Up"
- (David) Continuing community development of open standards like Open311 and the Open States Project API for state-level legislative data, in compliance with the OpenGovData principles.
- As suggested above: Convening best practices and standards for both policy and technology
- (Christopher) Develop a "Sales Kit" to bring to manager's and higher ups in order to encourage conversion from Gov 1.0 to 2.0 (Using examples from successful programs

elsewhere)
