Clarify Purpose:

- Attend the next meeting of NHEEC to discuss integrating the work of this group into their goals
- Use the acronym PIE to guide the scope of our work: P Policy; I Infrastructure; E -Education initiatives
- Share resources for presentations, brochures, events, potential educational forums

Active Groups in NH:

- NH Plastics Coalition a small ad hoc group identifying opportunities to build grassroots awareness leading to support for policy/legislation; also working with the NH congressional delegation to support the Break Free From Plastic Pollution Act (federal). Coalition consists of: Climate Reality Project NH Chapter (Bonnie Christie); Sierra Club (Cathy Corkery, Laura Magzis, Jerry Curran); Dover Dems Plastics Subcommittee (Kristine Baber); Surfrider Foundation NH Chapter (Christina Dubin)
- NRRA (Northeast Resource Recovery Association) non-profit organization serving as broker for municipalities to connect with markets for recyclables; excellent information source for all aspects of waste, including plastics
- Kearsage Environmental Group
- Local Sustainability, Recycling, and Town Waste Management/Recycling Committees
- UNH, Dartmouth, Plymouth State, Public Schools (Hanover, Hopkinton, Somersworth, etc.) -Environmental Action Clubs, Sustainability Committees, Food Service Departments, campus recycling groups, etc.
- Leaders in NH legislature: Rep. Judith Spang, Durham; Rep. Christy Bartlett, Concord;
 Senator David Watters, Dover

Legislative Activities to Date:

- NH: "As the chair of the HB 617 Committee to Study Recycling Streams and Solid Waste Management in New Hampshire, which issued a final report to the Governor of New Hampshire in November 2019, I became aware that municipalities in New Hampshire rely heavily on NRRA's efforts to make recycling financially sustainable. Our report found that municipalities in New Hampshire need more assistance with managing their solid waste and recycling programs. Our report also found that municipalities and residents would benefit from standardization of recycling messaging, which could help increase recycling. This is exactly the type of technical assistance NRRA proposes to provide through Recycling with Results." Rep. Karen Ebel, Democratic Leader Pro Tempore, NH House of Representatives
- NH: Bills to ban single use plastic bags- failed
- NH: Straws by request only failed
- NH: Enabling legislation to allow towns to pass municipal ordinances regulating plastics under existing authority of NH Solid Waste Law (RSA 149-M)- failed
- NOTE: none of this legislation was ultimately supported by the leadership of either party!
- Local: Portsmouth ordinances restricting polystyrene and single-use plastics; one ordinance bans distribution of polystyrene and single-use plastics on city properties/events/facilities; the other is city-wide ban on polystyrene in restaurants and retail businesses- passed by City Council
- Local: Dover Resolution for voluntary reduction of single use plastics passed by City Council
- Local: Dover Proclamation on plastic reduction month adopted by City Council
- National: Break Free From Plastic Pollution Act (S. 984, H.R. 2238): 101 House co-sponsors, 12 Senate co-sponsors, NONE FROM NH DELEGATION! This legislation was introduced in the 116th congress, no action. Reintroduced in 117th congress, now waiting for hearing schedule, gathering co-sponsors

Suggested Actions:

- Choose an initiative that the active groups can rally around
- Evaluate waiting on further NH legislative attempts until better political climate

- Meanwhile, focus on community level outreach to increase awareness of issues related to plastics/petrochemicals and work with congressional delegation to co-sponsor the BFFPPA
- Learn more about Community Action Works (Judith Bush is familiar)
- Identify concrete non-legislative actions that we can share with other groups
 - Plastic Free July Proclamations (Dover model)
 - Voluntary municipal plastics reduction resolutions (Dover model)
 - Rotary Club Presentations (Hopkinton powerpoint; Dover presentation and handout)
 - o PPTs, Handouts, Flyers already created
 - Dover Public Library presentations
- Gather existing templates for presentations, brochures, flyers

Suggested Focus Statement:

The NH Recycling Accountability Working Group supports the development of legislation to place responsibility for the treatment and disposal of single use and other plastic waste on producers, manufacturers, and retailers in New Hampshire. The group is also developing non-legislative initiatives related to public education and municipal ordinances, proclamations, and resolutions for eliminating the use of single use plastics and polystyrene.
