WWII Infographics Project World History

Overview

World War II was the bloodiest conflict in human history. Some 50-60 million people were killed over its course. Many historians will argue that this war was one of the most significant events simply by the sheer volume of destruction that accompanied it. Throughout this year, we have focused on the human suffering that comes with war. For this project, you are going to use data from the war to answer the question: "How can we measure the death, destruction, and human suffering during World War II?"

Challenge

Using the <u>Infogr.am</u> online infographic tool, you are going to select some aspect of the war and create a chart, pie graph, or other visual representation of information to demonstrate this idea. You can compare the data to non-war information, include images, or relevant information.

Your infographic must include:

- At least one data visualization (graph, pie chart, etc.) from World War II
- At least one data visualization from another source
- At least one image
- Relevant text description that brings compares the two data visualizations.

Process

- 1. What is an infographic? Example #1, Example #2, Example #3, Project Example
- 2. Review the data sources below. Look for the statistics from an individual battle or a specific category.
- 3. Decide upon comparison. This needs to be something with a similar number consider populations, production, diseases, poverty, money, GDP, pollution, internet users (Facebook, instagram, etc.) Use <u>Worldometers.info</u> or <u>Census.gov</u> as a start, but don't be afriad to come up with other types of data. Mr. McDowell will help you find it if you envision it.
- 4. Complete the WWII Infographics Planning Sheet.
- 5. Set up an infogr.am account.
- 6. Create your graphs using the built in spreadsheet.
- 7. Add your images and text.
- 8. Submit published infographic to WWII Infographic Form.
