What Mistakes to Avoid When Learning Korean Online

1. Over-relying on one resource

8. Focusing too much on grammar

Because Korean grammar seems fairly complex, it can be overwhelming for many people. Trying to memorize every word will not allow you to make progress, so this can become a chore instead of something enjoyable.

What to do: Learn grammar in stages. First, start with basic sentence structures and build from there. Do not feel the need to know every little thing at first. Try using the grammar you're learning in real sentences to reinforce your understanding of the grammar.

9. Underestimating Korean culture

Korean is deeply tied to culture. Ignoring the cultural context behind certain phrases or behaviors can lead to misunderstandings. Cultural knowledge enriches your language learning and helps you use Korean appropriately.

10. Using translation apps too much
