

HAWLEY NAMED TO HANDLE VETS' PLACEMENT CASES

Ce Oshkosh Man Is Promoted to
New Position in Office of
United States Employment
Service

Clifford S. Hawley has been appointed veterans' representative for the Oshkosh office of the war manpower commission's United States employment service, according to an announcement made today by Murt Malone, manager.

Mr. Hawley is a World war I veteran and was selected for his

new position from registers established by the state merit system and approved by the federal civil service commission. His service with the local employment office began in 1934 with the U. S. reemployment service. In 1936, the state bureau of personnel approved his appointment an interviewer.

Knows Veterans' Problems

Due to his extensive military experience, Mr. Hawley is familiar with veteran problems. After serving as enlisted man on the Mexican border he served in the U. S. army as sergeant with Company "B" 127th infantry of Oshkosh during 1916, 1917 and 1918 until seriously wounded in France and returned to the United States for hospitalization.

As a member of 32nd division association, the Military Order of the Purple Heart and the local posts of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars, he is intimately familiar with the problems of the veterans of World war I and II concerning employment, rehabilitation, training and other veterans' services.

To Aid Placement

As part of the nationwide expansion of the veterans' employment service program, Mr. Hawley will be responsible for the vocational guidance and placement program for veterans in the local area and will advise them of other benefits which are available to assist them in reestablishing themselves in civilian life.

Clifford S. Hawley, 90, Oshkosh, died Tuesday afternoon in Park View Health Center.

He was born Dec. 15, 1895, in Oshkosh, the son of Burton and Julia Hawley. He married Carrie Johnson June 21, 1920, in Oshkosh.

Mr. Hawley served in the Army during World War I and had received the Purple Heart. He attended the University of Wisconsin-Madison and had been employed by Job Service, the Carl Nowak and the Lampert construction companies and the Miles Kimball Co. He was a member of Plymouth Congregational Church, Cook-Fuller American Legion Post No. 70 and its Last Man's Club, World War I Barracks 1472, the Red Arrow Division, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Disabled American Veterans.

Surviving are his widow; eight daughters, Mrs. Robert Behnke, Mrs. Donald (Carol) Frank. Mrs. Robert (Janet) Himmler, Mrs. Francis (Joyce) Rasey, Mrs. Edwin (Ruth) Anderson and Mrs. Ray (Kathyrn) Tice, all of Oshkosh, Mrs. (Alice) Edward Wachtveitl. Rockford, Ill., and Mrs. Russell (Doris) Bounds, Belvedere, Ill.; four sons, Donald, Gerald and Wayne, all of Oshkosh, and David, Appleton; 37 grandchildren and 26 greatgrandchildren.
