Course Title

AVID Senior Seminar (AVID 12)

Purpose of the Course

AVID is a college prep class designed to assist students that are most underrepresented in the 4-year college system, work toward college acceptance. AVID students will learn organizational and study skills, work on critical thinking and inquiry based learning, get academic help from peers and college tutors, and participate in enrichment and motivational activities (such as guest speakers and university field trips) that make college more attainable. AVID students strive to become academically successful leaders and role models for other students. To remain in good standing, AVID students must maintain appropriate grades, behavior, and school attendance.

All AVID seniors must:

- -Complete the FAFSA by the teacher's designated deadline
- -Apply to a four year university
- -Apply for at least one scholarship
- -Fulfill all other aspects of the Sage Creek AVID Contract

Prerequisite

All students enrolled in AVID Senior Seminar must have taken AVID 10 and AVID 11 and completed all of the required college prep assignments in order to continue to AVID Senior Seminar.

Corequisite

All students enrolled in AVID Senior Seminar must enroll in AP Psychology during senior year.

Curriculum Overview

WICOR Framework

Our curriculum is based on WICOR, the foundation of AVID methodology:

- Writing: Learning through writing across all subject areas
- Inquiry: Using questioning and close reading to deepen understanding
- Collaboration: Working effectively with peers to support learning
- Organization: Developing systems to manage academic and personal responsibilities
- Reading: Building critical reading and analytical skills

Throughout the year, students will develop and practice these essential skills in all aspects of the course.

Course Units

Focused Note-Taking

Students will review and refine college-level note-taking strategies, including:

- Cornell Notes and two-column formats
- Graphic organizers and text annotation
- Processing notes through reflection and summary
- Connecting learning across subjects

Senior Tutorials

Students participate in collaborative tutorials every Thursday to support their academic classes:

- Present points of confusion from core classes
- Use Socratic dialogue to assist peers through inquiry
- Work with peer and college tutors
- Lead their own tutorial groups with minimal facilitation
- Document problem-solving processes and reflect on learning

Organizational Skills

Students refine organizational systems for college success:

- Effective planner use
- Maintaining an organized binder system
- Time management strategies

College Preparation

Students finalize their college applications and transition plans:

- Applications: Finalizing UC Personal Insight Questions, Activities and Awards Chart, Common Application essays, and Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) short essays
- Recommendations: Learning how to request letters of recommendation
- **Financial Aid**: Completing the FAFSA, researching scholarship opportunities, learning how to read financial aid packages, and comparing packages across schools
- **Transition Planning**: Preparing for first-year challenges, especially for first-generation college students; researching resources available at the university they will be attending

AP Psychology Support

All AVID seniors are required to take AP Psychology. Dedicated time in AVID will be provided to support students in this course. AP Psychology is similar to a college-level class and provides an excellent opportunity to practice:

- College-level note-taking strategies
- Applying psychological concepts to real-world scenarios
- Higher-level analysis and critical thinking
- Study skills for rigorous coursework
