COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a study of the histories and comedies with a focus on their historical contexts and on the major interpretive approaches. 3 hours. Prerequisites: ENGL 2050, ENGL 2230 and one ENGL 2100-level literature course, each with a grade of B or higher.

Regarding course texts:

• The ISBNs you see here are for the editions (Folger) that I've ordered through the campus bookstore, but any print edition with footnotes and line numbers should be fine.

- Arden, Norton, Oxford, Folger, Signet, and Pelican are usually solid choices. You can also find them at local bookstores, used bookstores, Amazon.com, the library, etc.
- If you're not sure you're getting the right thing, feel free to send me a link or text me a pic of the cover to make sure.
- You can buy them as we go, so plan accordingly. (We may or may not get to all five, so you may want to hold off on *Merchant* until we're sure we'll have time to fit it in.)
- **Not recommended**: gigantic hardback editions of all Shakespeare's plays (they weigh a ton, have tiny print, and the ones that aren't prohibitively expensive are cheap for a reason).
- **Absolutely forbidden**: online texts (except when necessary the first week or so); "No Fear Shakespeare" or anything else that "translates" the text into modern English.
- We are reading Henry IV part 1 and Henry V--make sure not to accidentally get 2 Henry IV, 1 Henry VI, 2 Henry VI, 3 Henry VI, or Henry VIII

GRADING SCALE

This is just an outline of the course requirements--make sure to check the course schedule for links to specific assignment prompts!

Coursework (50%):

- Reading responses (due MW 12:00 via D2L)
- Status updates (brief check-in responses, due once every two weeks via D2L)
- Any in-class writing, group work, etc. that we complete during class time

Note: Since your responsibilities include being present and engaged during class, classwork grades may be docked for frequent/unexplained tardiness/leaving early or failing to make responsible use of class time.

Drafts (20%):

- Proposal: A short, informal paper outlining your plans for your final essay. Material from this assignment can be incorporated into the essay. ~300-500w.
- Quotation analyses: List of quotations you want to use in your paper and what you want to say about them.
- First draft: Draft focusing on your **primary** text (that is, don't look at any secondary sources yet unless I specifically tell you otherwise). Length TBA.
- Annotated bibliography: Works Cited page of at least 5 potential sources for paper, with about a
 paragraph of commentary for each source (what it is and why you want to use it).
- Second draft: Draft including secondary sources. Length TBA.

Paper (25%)

- Thesis-driven analysis; details forthcoming.
- ~3000-3500w, at least 5 viable secondary sources. MLA format.
- It is your responsibility to make use of office hours/the Writing Center if you have concerns about the paper.
