

Re: Faculty Vigil for Freedom of Speech & Peaceful Assembly, 2-6 pm M-F.

Less than one week ago, the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) issued a powerful statement "[In Defense of the Right to Free Speech and Peaceful Protest on University Campuses](#)" signed by faculty chapters and unions across the country, prompting AAUP President Irene Mulvey to thank faculty everywhere "for standing up and speaking out to defend free speech and peaceful protests on our campuses and for condemning in the strongest possible terms the repressive and violent militarized responses ordered by college and university administrators" (email to members on May 03, 2024).

It is in this spirit that we, the undersigned faculty, invite faculty members to join in vigil for the rights of free speech, public assembly, and peaceful dissent at the University of Oregon.

Our Asks:

First, if you are available, please join us on **Monday 5/6/24 from 5:30pm to 7:30pm** on 13th Ave at the north edge of the Quad and the student encampment to unite as faculty in vigil for their rights to peacefully assemble and express dissent.

Second, we intend to continue this vigil. Could you please sign up for a 1-2 hour shift Monday through Friday between 2:00pm and 6:00pm? [Sign up here](#)

Third, we will organize a delegation of faculty to work with [the UO's "Demonstration Education and Safety Team"](#) to ensure respect for students' rights.

Why do this?

We stand by the rights for free speech and peaceful assembly, as enshrined in the UO's [free speech](#) and [academic freedom](#) policies, [state law](#), and the [U.S. Constitution](#). We recognize the flagrant violations of these rights in the mass arrests, violent intimidation by far right counter-protestors, and in administrators all too easily [swayed by politicians demanding troops and militarized coercion](#) on our campuses, major donors who would bring partisan agendas to our universities, and complaints (some fabricated) by parents or other interest groups. **If the administrators on our campus succumb to authoritarian playbooks to repress peaceful protests, what does this mean for our democratic society?**

Admirably, up to this point, the University of Oregon has honored these rights for our students and should be acknowledged for doing so. We also recognize the students who have maintained a disciplined, safe, and open space for free expression and inquiry. However, there remains an elevated risk to the integrity of our academic mission should repression and intimidation engulf our campus. **The intention of a repeated presence of faculty holding vigil is to encourage an institutional response to the encampment and related peaceful protests rooted in dialogue and consideration, and not be allowed to escalate into any form of repression or retaliation, including any threats or use of violence by police.**

We echo President Mulvey of the AAUP who presciently wrote in December 2023 that: “Universities have an obligation to protect the safety of their students and to promote a healthy campus culture. At the same time, universities have an obligation to ensure a climate promoting academic freedom and freedom of expression. These obligations are not in conflict. **The AAUP unequivocally rejects all efforts to curtail academic freedom and compromise the autonomy of universities and the speech and associational rights of faculty and students through a false choice between “safety” and free inquiry.** We must not allow partisan actors to exploit this moment to demand further control over university curriculum and policy in order to shape American higher education to a political agenda. Politicians and donors must not be allowed to determine what speech or conduct is permitted on a campus, or to sow division in order to restrict what may be thought, said, or taught on our campuses.” (our emphasis, [Mulvey 12/12/2023](#)).

We also remain hopeful about real progress on campuses where administrators listened and negotiated to reach agreements: [Northwestern University](#), [Brown University](#), [Evergreen State College](#), and [Rutgers University](#). We hope that the University of Oregon can be added to the list of positive examples as we uphold our values as a public university in a democratic society.
