## **Choice Board Resources**

Here are some ideas to use when creating Choice Boards. If you are interested in making Interactive Choice Boards, there is a great tutorial <u>found here</u> on how to create "drop and drag" activities in Google Slides.

## **Choice Board Activities should:**

- Focus attention on the components of an effective literacy program phonics, phonemic awareness, vocabulary, fluency, comprehension, and writing.
- Cater to different learning styles
- Make tasks easy to understand for parents and students
- Stimulate practice of specific skills
- Include links and visuals when appropriate
- Use materials and items found regularly in most homes.
- Adapt the ideas below regardless of grade band to make them appropriate for your grade levels/student interest.

ELA	<ul> <li>Read a book to a stuffed animal</li> <li>How many words are in this sentence? Do that many jumping jacks.</li> <li>Write your name (word, sentence etc) in rainbow colors</li> <li>Write your first and last name in your favorite color</li> <li>Name 3 things that are (green, blue, red etc)</li> <li>Draw a picture for the word</li> <li>How many letters are in your first name? Stack that many blocks. (Have parent take a picture, send to GClassroom etc)</li> <li>Make letters with Play-doh</li> <li>How many words can you make with the following letters (a, m, t)</li> <li>Link a Scholastic News article for students to read with a family member (free articles available at each grade level)</li> <li>Link an article from Tween Tribune Junior for students to read with a family member.</li> <li>Word sorts (word families, letter sounds etc)</li> <li>Give a list of words, have students circle all the vowels in red</li> <li>Create rhyme pairs</li> <li>Abc order with a short list of words</li> <li>Give a word blend/digraph etc. and have students write as many words as they can using it (tr- cr- sh-)</li> <li>Link a Jack Hartman video to promote singing, learning and moving</li> <li>Listen to a story read aloud</li> <li>Storyline</li> <li>Just Books Read Aloud</li> <li>Story Time From Space</li> </ul>
