What is this course about?

This course is designed for those who do not have English as their first language. The main aims are to:

- To provide appropriate academic pathways for English language learners (ELLs) to transition to mainstream English
- To develop the four language skills (Reading, Writing, Listening, Speaking);
- To provide opportunities to upskill to Level 2 or 3 and gain University Entrance literacy credits
- To ensure students can gain credits for their Record of Learning (ROL);
- To provide cross-curricular support for ELLs;
- To give students opportunities to live and study successfully in Aotearoa, New Zealand.

What sorts of things will I do?

- read and write simple recounts.
- read and process simple information texts.
- write descriptions.
- write responses to texts you read.
- discuss current issues.
- watch and listen to visual texts.

- present information on everyday topics.

ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages)

EAP (English for Academic Purposes) is a subject name such as Math

EL (English Language)
