Dear Chairman Hunt and members of the House Commerce and Consumer Affairs Committee,

Good morning, my name is **[name]** and I live in **[town]**, NH. I practice as a chiropractor in **[town]**. I am writing to you today to strongly encourage you to support HB 303, relative to insurance coverage for pain management services.

For decades, we have known that interdisciplinary, comprehensive care is the best way to address chronic pain. Access to a variety of pain management services empowers patients, leads to better outcomes, and is cost-effective. Research demonstrates that access to nonpharmacologic pain management services like chiropractic can reduce the need for escalated care¹, and that chiropractic is associated with substantially decreased early and long-term use of opioids. Studies also indicate that chiropractic care for chronic pain can lead to long-term cost savings for insurers.

While a handful of insurance plans do offer more comprehensive coverage of pain management services, there is a significant lack of uniformity between plans. As providers, we still frequently see limited and insufficient access to these services and know patients who are unable to continue receiving the care that they need. Some health insurance plans limit patients a small number of visits, or only cover chiropractic care for acute pain. As a profession, we believe it is necessary to protect patient rights to access a variety of nonpharmacologic pain management services.
