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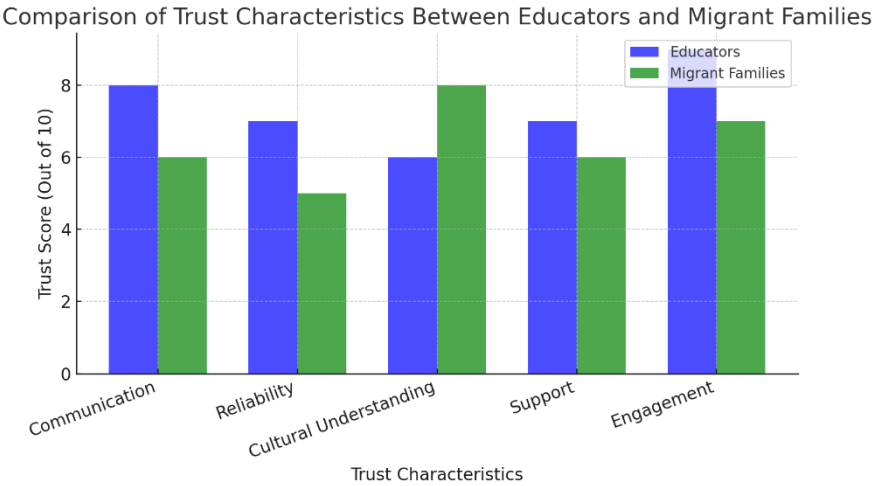


Figure 2. Comparison of Trust Characteristics Between Educator and Migrant Families
