General Questions

1. Describe your qualifications for the office you are seeking.

I am a proud mom of a rising third grader at Alice Fong Yu. My parents are refugee survivors of political persecution. As a child who was mute, I benefited from early prevention programs and GATE. I believe it is a right for every child to have individualized support that best suits their needs.

With a 20-year career rooted in service and education, I have been a lifelong advocate for marginalized children, families, and communities, from birth to adulthood. Through my family's experience and the past seven years of leadership in early childhood development, I recognize the sacrifices that shape the journey of parenthood and understand the impact of trauma on children's learning. I am committed to closing equity gaps for underserved communities by prioritizing early interventions for those who need them most.

My volunteer roles include serving as a Committee of 100 Next Generation Leader, participating in the Wah Mei School ExCEL Parent Advisory, and co-founding and serving as VP of the giveabeat.org. Our mission at giveabeat.org is to harness the power of music as a pathway to healing and opportunity for those impacted by mass incarceration.

2. Specify key endorsements you have and why they are meaningful to you.

I am proud to be endorsed by current School Board Commissioners Jenny Lam and Mark Sanchez, as well as former School Board Presidents, Norman Yee and Dr. Emily Murase. I also have endorsements from the current CCSF Board of Trustees, President Alan Wong and Aliya Chisti, as well as Supervisor Rafael Mandelman, and many respected community leaders including Steven Lee and Reverend Sonya Brunswick. (See list [here](#).) I will continue to garner endorsements from elected officials, educators, parents, and community leaders over the next few weeks.

These endorsements are meaningful to me because they show support from longtime educators as well as representation from different ends of the political spectrum. My endorsers and mentors have been at the forefront of developing an accessible and excellent public education system including ground-breaking multicultural and bilingual language programs, universal early care and education, and Free City College. If elected to the school board, I am committed to keeping the focus on tangible student outcomes that don't sacrifice equity or excellence.

3. What is your win number? How many doors have you knocked so far in your race, and how many do you plan to knock?

With a tight race expected, our campaign aims to get 150,000 votes in the upcoming November election.

I have not started door-to-door voter outreach; instead, I have been working hard to meet with parents, students, educators, early childcare providers, and key decision-makers in the City daily to hear their concerns and demands as the school district enters a critical period over the next several years.

I am focused on fundraising and recruiting volunteers to ensure we have the necessary resources to run a successful grassroots campaign that can accurately reflect the voices and demands of parents, students, and educators.

4. What is your fundraising goal, and how much have you raised so far? What percent of your donations is under \$20?

My goal is \$75,000 and I've raised \$14,000 in under 3 weeks. Currently, under 2% of donations are under \$20. I have been working on larger donations from friends and family to get started, but I expect that as we move forward in the campaign, donations will be in smaller amounts.

5. What will you do to end homelessness in your jurisdiction (short- and long-term)? The US Supreme Court recently ruled in favor of allowing cities to enforce bans on sleeping outdoors. Should San Francisco have and enforce such a ban? Why or why not?

In the short-term, I will advocate for preventative measures to keep families and individuals in their homes, such as Access Points to coordinate emergency support for food, rental assistance, child care, health care, legal services, and mental health and wellness; expansion of transitional housing and shelter beds; and deploying mobile outreach teams to engage with individuals where they are, offering immediate support and connections to services.

In the long-term, I will work with the Department of Early Childhood, SFUSD, City College, and community organizations to ensure every child has access to excellent early childhood education, PK-12, and higher education so they are prepared for lifelong success.

Bans on sleeping outdoors will not solve the homelessness crisis and will cost taxpayers more money in the long-term by paying into the incarceration system instead of prevention. Many who end up in the justice system start as school age drop outs and foster children. My priority as a School Board candidate is to keep kids in school by addressing chronic absenteeism and supporting those at-risk of homelessness.

6. What work have you done to address economic inequality and housing unaffordability? If elected, what will you do to address them?

I come from a low-income, immigrant background and I have the lived experience of the predatory systems that target marginalized communities of color and LEP. My family has faced eviction and I have been priced out of non rent controlled living situations. My entire career in nonprofits, as a founder and leader, has been dedicated to addressing economic inequality.

One of the ways to help families afford their housing was the passage of Proposition C (also known as "Baby C") to raise and direct approximately \$146 million dollars per year to a fund that supports early child care and education infrastructure in San Francisco. In my previous role, I supported the measure to increase teacher wages, expand child care payment subsidies to reach more low-moderate income families, reduce the child care waitlist, support small businesses, and enhance early childhood wraparound programs for children under age six. Subsidizing child care means families have more funds to put towards housing, increased wages mean teachers can afford rent in the city, and supporting home-based child care businesses means owners can stay in their homes and earn income.

7. How have you addressed racial injustice and police brutality? How will you work to ensure Limited English Proficient (LEP) community members have access to government services?

I co-founded giveabeat.org in direct response to racial injustice and police brutality.

In my previous role as Director of Advancement, I authored public statements supporting the Black Lives Matter movement, condemning police brutality, and advocating for the Stop AAPI Hate movement following the Atlanta spa shootings, which tragically disregarded Asian lives.

Additionally, I collaborated closely with the Office of Civic Engagement and Immigrant Affairs and citywide coalitions to facilitate Census 2020 outreach in hard-to-reach communities. At Wu Yee, I spearheaded an extensive resource outreach program for Limited English Proficiency (LEP) communities. I also initiated and partnered on multicultural events such as the inaugural International Children's Day event in the Bayview and Job and Wellness fairs in Sunnydale/Visitation Valley to connect community members to services.

If elected to the school board, I will ensure that SFUSD maintains and expands its language pathway programs to cultivate a bilingual workforce capable of effectively serving our LEP community.

8. How have you supported LGBTQ residents, and how will you, if elected?

I am committed to equal rights for all, regardless of gender, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, color, origin, or abilities, including parenting, marriage, healthcare, and legal protection. As a school board candidate, I will prioritize safety, acceptance, and foster inclusive environments for LGBTQ students, teachers, and staff.

I recognize the overrepresentation of LGBTQ individuals in incarceration rates and homelessness. Our public school system can play a pivotal role in closing these disparities by implementing robust early interventions and mental health support for our students. Creating a safe and nurturing environment is crucial for the growth, development, and success of our LGBTQ community within schools.

I am committed to uplifting LGBTQ voices and ensuring their representation in leadership positions to uphold and protect their rights. I will partner with community leaders, parents, and students to listen, learn, and foster an inclusive and supportive educational environment where every student can learn, grow, and thrive.

9. Describe your work addressing the climate crisis, and what specific steps you will take to confront climate change and environmental injustice.

In my previous role, I coordinated a panel featuring the late Dr. Burt Lubin, Dr. Anda Kuo, and Assemblymember David Chiu to address the critical issue of social determinants of health and their profound impact on life outcomes. Environmental injustices in specific zip codes significantly affect children's development and educational outcomes.

As a student of Social Ecology at UCI, I am dedicated to embracing new urbanization principles in our community's growth to improve the quality of life for all residents. This approach prioritizes sustainable city planning that minimizes environmental impact and enhances resource efficiency.

By fostering inclusive neighborhoods with accessible amenities and affordable housing options, we can create vibrant, resilient communities where all students thrive. I advocate for smart growth strategies that promote walkability, public transit use, and community engagement in decision-making processes. It's crucial to integrate technological innovations and prioritize infrastructure that supports a healthy environment and enhances quality of life. Together, we can build excellent, world-class schools and neighborhoods that our children deserve.

10. Describe a time when you worked against an established power structure or entrenched authority to achieve a change. How was this change accomplished?

When my family was facing foreclosure and eviction during the mortgage crisis in 2013, I joined The Alliance of Californians for Community Empowerment (ACCE) to advocate for policies and actions aimed at protecting homeowners and tenants, preventing foreclosures, and holding financial institutions accountable. Actions included trips to Sacramento and holding a protest at Wells Fargo Bank.

In my previous role, our early care and education (ECE) coalitions advocated for “Baby Prop C,” which has successfully established the most expansive early education system in the nation to support working families, raise wages for educators and women of color, support child care small businesses, and prevent poverty and homelessness.

With the lived experience of structural and systemic racism my family faced and the understanding that Black/African American and Latino/x are incarcerated at exponentially higher rates, givebeat.org was founded to provide a pathway for healing for those who are impacted by mass incarceration.

If elected to the school board, I am committed to maintaining and expanding on early education and interventions to keep kids in school to improve academic success and lifelong outcomes for each and every child.

11. Among San Franciscans with HIV, overdose is the #1 cause of death, 1/6 are homeless (or at-risk), and new infections are increasing. 50% of HIV-related federal funding is at risk. How will you address this and involve HIV communities directly in your decision making? Will you support housing subsidies, fully funded HIV programming, and decriminalization of substance use? Why / why not?

As a former board member at NextAid, a nonprofit leveraging music to aid sustainable development for vulnerable communities impacted by AIDS, I bring a deep commitment to addressing healthcare access and mental health support.

My experience as a Medi-Cal enrollment specialist has underscored the link between healthcare access, homelessness, and declining mental health outcomes. I advocate for prioritizing HIV-affected communities by focusing on equitable access to healthcare, mental health services, supportive housing, and essential resources.

I support decriminalizing substance abuse and redirecting funds to prevention efforts and supportive services for HIV impacted communities. Addressing rising drug use, particularly with the widespread availability of prescription drugs, is crucial for long-term taxpayer savings and healthier communities. According to studies, every dollar spent on treatment and prevention is ten dollars saved in economic loss, emergency services, and incarceration. Our public schools play a pivotal role in prevention through awareness, early intervention programs, targeted curricula, and coordinated care for students.

12. What is your commitment to transgender, non-binary, two-spirit, intersex, and gender-expansive individuals in lieu of Banko Brown’s murder and 320 transgender people killed in 2023 (a historically underreported statistic)? How will you ensure justice and equity for all transgender individuals?

I am committed to advocating for comprehensive legal protections and fostering inclusive environments for our transgender community. I will champion anti-hate and anti-discrimination campaigns on campuses, promoting dialogue, compassion, and empathy. Upholding laws that safeguard transgender individuals in employment, housing, healthcare, education, and public services is crucial.

In our schools, I will prioritize transgender visibility and awareness to combat stereotypes and stigma. Exposure to our diverse communities in early education fosters understanding and acceptance among students. I pledge to collaborate closely with the transgender community to ensure I am an effective ally.

Furthermore, I recognize the importance of arts education for student well-being and expression. I will support and expand arts programming in schools to provide healing spaces and promote storytelling that celebrates transgender experiences and identities. I will partner with our transgender leaders to create schools where every student feels valued, respected, and empowered to thrive.

13. How long have you lived in your jurisdiction? Explain any effects of redistricting.

I have lived in District 11 for 6 years, prior to that I have also lived in District 9 for 6 years, and District 5 for 4 years. My nonprofit work has served communities citywide. Redistricting impacts community identity, representation, and ability to advocate for funding to support shared interests. It dilutes the voice of impacted communities and makes their needs invisible, which disproportionately affects our transgender communities and communities of color.

1. What is your position on closing public schools in the San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD)?

To address SFUSD's budget deficit, we must carefully evaluate classroom consolidations and potential school co-locations and closures. It's crucial to scrutinize the plan closely and ensure ongoing engagement with community members and board stakeholders as we move forward.

The decisions under the Resource Alignment Initiative must be grounded in comprehensive data, thoughtful planning, and robust community involvement—from parents and educators to staff and students. While school consolidations are essential, they alone cannot resolve our budget challenges. As a leader, I recognize the necessity of making difficult decisions with empathy, always prioritizing children and their educational outcomes. Ongoing decisions must be inclusive and equitable, and executed in the best interest of our students while maintaining high-quality education and enhancing classroom environments.

I am committed to safeguarding our marginalized communities from disproportionate impacts. Consolidating classrooms should redirect resources to support fully enrolled schools and ensure every student has a supported teacher throughout the school year. I will hold the administration accountable for delivering excellent instruction and improving overall classroom experiences, ensuring that every decision advances the long-term strength of our educational system and prioritizes keeping kids in classrooms.

2. Do you support charter schools in San Francisco? Why or why not?

No, I do not support increasing the number of charter schools in the city. Studies show that they cost more to maintain and may contribute to increased isolation between communities. It also may also divert funding from the overall school district which may create more inequities.

3. Do you support Common Core education standards?

Common Core education standards serve as one benchmark for assessing career and college readiness, but they should not be the sole approach. Our educational programs must embrace personalized learning, incorporating culturally affirming early interventions and differentiated pathways to narrow equity gaps in math, literacy, and college preparedness.

My work with low-income communities of color has deeply influenced my perspective on how environmental, systemic, and structural racism can hinder children's educational outcomes. Addressing these disparities requires a collaborative community effort within our public schools.

I am committed to creating inclusive pathways that offer support to children facing behavioral challenges stemming from issues like hunger, external stressors, trauma, or special needs. It is crucial that we implement supportive programs tailored to their needs to ensure every child can thrive academically and personally.

4. What is your plan to address the bullying of LGBTQ students, as well as students of traditionally marginalized communities?

I am committed to implementing a comprehensive plan to address bullying which will focus on preventative measures and curriculum that empower students to recognize and deescalate risky behaviors. It is crucial that students have access to mental health support, restorative justice practices, therapy, and a diverse care team including social workers, counselors, and peer and community support.

No teacher or student should fear reporting risky behaviors. We must address concerns about retaliation that have been reported, ensuring that our anonymous tip line is bolstered with broader education initiatives and stronger connections to resources for families. SFUSD must prioritize robust early interventions and socioemotional development programs to support student mental health and well-being.

Additionally, addressing cyberbullying and digital addiction is paramount. We must educate students about the risks of social media use, establish clear codes of conduct that promote healthy technology habits, and ensure these expectations are consistently met.

5. How will you address the needs of homeless students?

Drawing from my experience with the largest provider of Head Start and Early Head Start programs, I understand the critical importance of family advocates who will actively assist parents in connecting with partner organizations, applying for public benefits, and securing stable housing. I will advocate for the establishment of a coordinated care team dedicated to providing essential services such as emergency shelter, rental assistance, childcare, food support, transportation, and workforce development programs.

Early identification of families at risk of chronic absenteeism will be a priority. By forming supportive teams around these families, we aim to ensure that every child remains engaged in their education. Data indicates that factors such as parental job loss, single-parent households, foster care, and children with special needs contribute significantly to the risk of homelessness and dropout rates.

In the short term, we will explore innovative strategies, such as repurposing underutilized school properties and buildings, to provide immediate support to families experiencing homelessness. By taking proactive measures and fostering community partnerships, we can create a more equitable and supportive educational environment for all students.

6. What are your plans to protect undocumented students and their families?

I am dedicated to advocating for the rights and protections of undocumented students and families in San Francisco. I will collaborate closely with the Office of Civic Engagement and Immigrant Affairs, as well as community organizations, to promote DACA renewals and ensure that all eligible individuals can participate in school board elections. It's crucial to raise awareness about the rights of undocumented students, including confidentiality, equal treatment, and access to public schools and services.

I will actively support initiatives that provide access to legal resources and workforce programs, empowering undocumented students to pursue their educational goals and thrive in our community. By fostering a supportive and inclusive environment, we can ensure that every student, regardless of immigration status, has the opportunity to succeed in San Francisco's public schools.

7. What are the most important actions that you could take in office to support black students?

As a school board candidate committed to the needs of our black students, it's imperative to listen to our communities and work alongside parents, teachers, and community leaders to foster culturally affirming environments where they feel safe and valued. We must openly acknowledge and affirm their lived experiences while confronting our nation's history of racism and exploitation of communities of color. Healing begins with recognizing these truths, validating people's experiences, challenging the status quo, and working intentionally to dismantle the systems that continue to keep people oppressed.

To support black students effectively, we must collaborate closely with parents, caregivers, and community organizations to develop comprehensive individualized support plans that promote health, wellness, engagement and readiness for learning. Every student deserves access to teachers who understand their specific needs and can connect them and their families to a robust support network within the school community. I am committed to learning from and partnering with parents and community leaders to create an educational environment where black students thrive academically, socially, and emotionally.

8. Do you support alternatives to a student's suspension in instances of disruption or willful defiance?

Yes, I support alternatives to suspension. Ensuring the safety of all students is our first priority, including isolating those from violent and harmful situations. We must engage families alongside counselors, social workers, and mental health specialists to create individualized support plans. These plans should address environmental stressors like unstable housing, food insecurity, neurodivergence, adverse childhood experiences, and trauma that may impact behavior. Providing safe outlets such as art therapy or other expressive methods is crucial to healing and mental health. Additionally, we should prioritize training and mentoring students in peer mediation and restorative justice practices rather than resorting to punitive measures. It's essential to understand that suspensions alone do not contribute to long-term student well-being and can increase the risk of disengagement and dropout. As a candidate, I am committed to comprehensive early interventions and individualized support to keep kids in school.

9. What attributes would you consider if deciding on a permanent art installation at a school?

We must gather community input and survey what attributes would best inspire the community that will benefit from the installation. It must reflect the shared values of the community in which the piece will be installed.

10. What do you see as the contributing factors to the payroll system issues? How would you prevent this from repeating with the implementation target for next year?

I observe a deficiency in oversight, ineffective project management, and a contractor who has not adequately supported SFUSD with education, training, and ethical guidance for successful implementation and change management. The school board must rigorously oversee large projects to establish and ensure realistic expectations, targets, and goals are not only set but also consistently achieved.
