

GOAL: The goal of the school district's summer reading program is to foster a lifelong reading habit among students, while also encouraging them to continue to grow academically. Just like athletes work their muscles to grow and improve, students should work their brains.

TASK: Read material of your choice and keep a reading log of dates, times, and summaries. Submit your reading log to the media center or English teacher during the first week of the school year.

WHY READ?

- Reading is important because it develops the mind, leads us to discover new things, and helps to develop the imagination.
- Understanding the written word is one way the mind grows in its ability.
- Reading is fundamental in today's society.
- Reading is a vital skill in finding a new job. Many well-paying jobs require reading as a part of job
 performance. Reading is important because words -- spoken and written -- are the building blocks
 of life.

SUMMER READING PROGRAM DETAILS:

- 1. Read a **minimum of one hour each week**, for a total of **10 hours** for the summer. Students may choose to read *anything!* This includes novels, magazines, ebooks, newspapers, and other nonfiction selections -- this does not include social media.
- 2. Build reading stamina! Limit distractions while you read so that you can ask questions, make connections, visualize, and synthesize the information over an extended time.
- 3. Track your reading! As you read, complete the attached reading log. Bring your reading log with you the first week of school and submit it to your English teacher or the school librarian. Reading logs are available in paper and digital formats.

READING CELEBRATION

Each student who participates in the summer reading program by completing and submitting a reading log will earn rewards during the first few weeks of school. Rewards may include, but are not limited to: ice cream treats, tickets to school sporting events, school swag, free books, and a field trip to the 2024 SC Read-In.
